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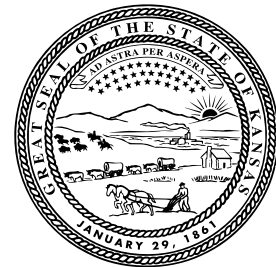

Notice Concerning Proposed Kansas Air Quality Class I Operating Permit Renewal

Notice is hereby given that the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. DCP Operating Company, L.P. – National Helium Gas Plant Complex has applied for a Class I operating permit renewal in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-510 et al. The purpose of a Class I permit is to identify the sources and types of regulated air pollutants emitted from the facility; the emission limitations, standards, and requirements applicable to each source; and the monitoring, record keeping, and reporting requirements applicable to each source as of the effective date of permit issuance.

DCP Operating Company, L.P. – National Helium Gas Plant Complex, 3201 Quail Springs Pkwy., Suite 100, Oklahoma City, OK 73134, owns and operates a facility that conducts natural gas compression, ethane extraction, and nitrogen and helium separation located at Section 23, Township 33S, Range 32W, Seward County, Kansas.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation, and all information relied upon during the permit application review process are available for public review during normal business hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the KDHE, Bureau of Air (BOA), 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366 and at the Southwest District Office, 302 W. Please direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Cathy Richardson, KDHE, BOA, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366. In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received no later than 12:00 p.m. Monday, November 27, 2023.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Cathy Richardson, KDHE BOA, 1000 SW Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, KS 66612-1366, no later than 12:00 p.m. Monday, November 27, 2023, in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the public comment period, within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA's 45-day review period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Interested consultants must submit a proposal to the appropriate bid form on Bid Express by 12:00 p.m. (Central Time) on November 10, 2023, to be considered for selection.

Consultant Prequalification

Interested consulting firms must be prequalified by KDOT or otherwise demonstrate qualification in the following categories:

- 231 – Traffic Control Analysis and Design

If a firm is not currently prequalified by KDOT, a proposal may still be submitted. Firms not prequalified must also provide documentation that demonstrates the firm is qualified for each specified category listed in this notice for the project. Consultants may create a team to meet the prequalification requirements. Background and Scope of Project

Periodically for a given project, KDOT personnel may be unable to perform permanent signing inventory, data collection, design, planning, or other tasks within the timeframe required so it may be necessary to engage a consultant firm on short notice. Contract Terms and Conditions

The full list of consultants holding a “Permanent On-Call Agreement” resulting from this Request for Proposals is intended to replace the existing list of “High Performance Signing On-Call Agreement” holders based on the contracts executed in 2019. Each 2019 contract will remain in effect until either the contract expiration date (without extension) or when KDOT has determined the consultant has reached the contract maximum cumulative aggregate maximum cost. Details of the Sale

Subject to the terms and requirements of the Official Notice of Bond Sale, dated October 3, 2023 (“Official Notice”), of the City of Garden City, Kansas (the “City”), bids to purchase the City’s General Obligation Bonds, Series A, 2023, (the “Bonds”) will be received at the office of the City Clerk at the City Administrative Center, 301 N. 8th, Garden City, KS 67846, or by telefacsimile at 620-276-1169, or electronically as described in the Official Notice, until 10:00 a.m. (Central Time) Tuesday, November 7, 2023. The bids will be considered by the governing body at its meeting at 1:00 p.m. (Central Time) on the sale date.

No oral or auction bids for the Bonds will be considered, and no bids for less than 100 percent of the total principal amount of the Bonds and accrued interest to the date of delivery shall be considered.

Good Faith Deposit

Bidders must submit a good faith deposit in the form of a wire transfer or certified or cashier’s check made payable to the order of the City, or a financial surety bond (if then available), in an amount equal to 2% of the principal amount of the Bonds.

Details of the Bonds

The Bonds will be dated December 5, 2023, and will be issued as registered bonds in denominations of \$5,000, or any integral multiple thereof. Interest on the Bonds is payable semiannually on May 1 and November 1 of each year, beginning May 1, 2024. Principal of the Bonds becomes due on November 1 in the years and amounts as shown below:

Payment of Principal and Interest

The Treasurer of the State of Kansas will serve as the Bond Registrar and Paying Agent for the Bonds.

Book-Entry Bonds

The Bonds will be issued and registered under a book-entry-only system administered by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York (“DTC”).

Delivery of the Bonds

The City will prepare the Bonds at its expense and will deliver the registered Bonds to DTC on or about December 5, 2023. Any bond printing costs will be paid by the City from the proceeds of the Bonds or other City funds.

Legal Opinion

The Bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Triplett Woolf Garretson, LLC, Wichita, Kansas, Bond Counsel, whose fees will be paid by the City.

Financial Matters

The City’s current assessed valuation for purposes of calculating statutory debt limitations is \$306,504,601. As of December 5, 2023, the City’s total outstanding general obligation debt (including the Bonds), is \$90,515,000*. The City’s total indebtedness that is subject to debt limitation, as of December 5, 2023, is estimated to be \$53,386,098.97*, which is 17.42%* of the assessed valuation of the City.

Notice of Revocation of Administrative Regulations

The following Kansas Department of Revenue, Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control (“ABC”) administrative rules and regulations have been identified in a five-year regulation review submitted to the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules and Regulations as regulations for revocation pursuant to K.S.A. 77-440 and 77-426. These revocations will be effective 15 days after publication of this notice.

Regulations for Revocation

K.A.R. 14-5-1. Alcoholic liquor (except beer) transported into state or federal area only by bonded carriers. | **14-5-2. Carriers' permits; application; fees.** These regulations, which relate to liquor carrier permits issued by ABC, are unnecessary because ABC no longer issues liquor carrier permits.

K.A.R. 14-5-4. Storage of alcoholic liquor and cereal malt beverage in transit in public liquor warehouses; reports of warehouseman. This regulation, which relates to public bonded liquor warehouses, is unnecessary because Kansas no longer has public bonded liquor warehouses.

K.A.R. 14-5-6. Required delivery of alcoholic liquor to distributor by common carrier. This regulation, which concerns delivery of alcoholic liquor from a common carrier to a licensed distributor or manufacturer, is unnecessary because it duplicates Kansas statute (K.S.A. 41-408).

K.A.R. 14-7-6. Kansas liquor stamps or strips; securing, affixation to original package; who shall affix; placing of stamps or strips. This regulation, which relates to Kansas-issued liquor stamps and strips, is unnecessary because Kansas no longer applies liquor stamps and strips.

K.A.R. 14-11-16. Farm wineries and farm winery outlets selling at retail; marking prices; price or inventory control tags; shelf markings. This regulation, which governs price markings for Kansas farm wineries and farm winery outlets, is unnecessary and not enforced.

K.A.R. 14-16-17. Hearing procedures; prehearing motions. | **14-16-18. Prehearing conference; availability; notice.** | **14-16-19. Hearing procedures.** These regulations, which provide procedural rules for ABC administrative proceedings, are unnecessary because they duplicate Kansas statute (the Kansas Administrative Procedure Act).

K.A.R. 14-17-5. Acceptance of hospitality by director and employees. This regulation, which forbids offering certain gifts to ABC employees, is unnecessary because of a broader prohibition on gifts in K.A.R. 14-17-6.

K.A.R. 14-19-4a. Liquor pool; storage. This regulation, which relates to club liquor pools, is unnecessary because liquor pools are no longer in use in Kansas.

K.A.R. 14-19-19. Change of club status. This regulation, which forbids "converting" a Class A Club license to a Class B Club or drinking establishment license, is unnecessary and not enforced.

K.A.R. 14-19-31. Clubs charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined. | **14-20-33. Clubs charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined.** | **14-21-16. Drinking establishments charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined.** | **14-22-17. Caterers charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined.** | **14-23-13. Charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined.** These regulations, which require licensees to sell an individual drink for a single price throughout the day, are now inconsistent with Kansas statute.

K.A.R. 14-19-33. Federal retail stamp. | **14-20-35. Federal retail stamp.** | **14-21-18. Federal retail stamp.** | **14-22-**

18. Federal retail stamp. These regulations, which require public display of a federal retail stamp, are unnecessary because federal retail stamps are no longer issued.

K.A.R. 14-19-37. Display of license. | **14-20-39. Display of license.** These regulations, which require public display of a liquor license, are unnecessary because they duplicate Kansas statute (K.S.A. 41-2612).

K.A.R. 14-23-2. Applications; documents required. | **14-23-4. Issuance of permit.** | **14-23-6. Refund upon voluntary cancellation.** | **14-23-7. Employees; prohibitions.** | **14-23-8. Purchase of alcoholic liquor; requirements and restrictions.** | **14-23-9. Permit holder's responsibility for conduct at event.** | **14-23-10. Removal of liquor from event premises prohibited; boundary requirement.** | **14-23-11. Nontaxed liquor; individual bringing alcoholic liquor on to permitted premises.** These regulations, which concern temporary permits to sell alcoholic liquor for consumption on unlicensed premises, are unnecessary because they duplicate Kansas statute (K.S.A. 41-1201, 41-1202, 41-1203).

State of Kansas**Board of Healing Arts****Permanent Administrative Regulation****Article 6.—LICENSES**

100-6-6. Reentry active license; medicine and surgery and osteopathic medicine. (a) Any physician, whether an applicant or a licensee, who has not engaged in the practice of the healing arts for the two-year period immediately preceding the filing of an application for a license or change of designation type pursuant to K.S.A. 65-2809, and amendments thereto, may be required to complete the terms and conditions of a reentry agreement that has been approved by the board, as a condition of licensure.

(b) Each physician who has not practiced the healing arts for the two-year period immediately preceding the filing of an application for a license or change of designation type shall submit a proposed reentry plan for review by the board. The proposed reentry plan shall contain the following:

(1) The name of a supervising physician, who shall be approved by the board;

(2) an assessment of the physician's current strengths and weaknesses in the intended area or areas of practice. The assessment may include testing and evaluation by colleagues, educators, or others;

(3) an education component that addresses the physician's area or areas of needed improvement, if any, and consists of a reentry period of monitored practice and education upon terms based on the factors listed in subsection (c); and

(4) documentation that an insurer intends to issue the physician a policy of professional liability insurance pur-

suant to K.S.A. 40-3402, and amendments thereto, and certification from the physician that the premium surcharges pursuant to K.S.A. 40-3404, and amendments thereto, will be paid.

(c) Factors that may affect the length and the scope of the reentry plan shall include the following:

- (1) The physician’s amount of time out of practice;
(2) the prior work schedule when practicing;
(3) the reason for the interruption in practice;
(4) the physician’s activities during the interruption in practice, including the amount of practice-relevant continuing medical education or any healthcare-related volunteer work;
(5) the physician’s previous and intended area or areas of practice;
(6) the changes in each intended area of practice during the time that the physician has been out of continuous practice;
(7) the number of years since the physician completed graduate medical education, including fellowship if applicable; and
(8) the physician’s length of active practice after completing graduate medical education.

(d) Depending on the amount of time out of practice, the physician may be required to meet one or more of the following requirements:

- (1) Undergo a competency evaluation or assessment approved by the board;
(2) practice for a specified period of time under a supervising physician, who shall provide periodic reports to the board;
(3) complete any accredited postgraduate or clinical fellowship training approved by the board, if the need for this training is indicated by the competency evaluation or assessment; or
(4) complete a board-approved reentry-to-practice or monitoring program.

(e) If the board approves the physician’s proposed reentry plan, the approved agreement shall be a professional development plan pursuant to K.S.A. 65-2838a, and amendments thereto, or shall be incorporated by reference into a nondisciplinary approved reentry plan and executed by the physician, the board, and any applicable board staff.

(f) After the reentry plan has been signed and approved by the board, the physician shall receive a reentry active license. While holding a reentry active license, the physician shall not practice outside the scope of the approved reentry plan during the reentry period.

(g) The reentry active license may be renewed one time without board approval. Each additional renewal of the reentry active license shall be subject to board approval.

(h) The license may be cancelled upon any of the following, subject to notice and an opportunity for a hearing:

- (1) The licensee practiced outside the scope of the approved reentry plan.
(2) The licensee did not satisfactorily complete the approved reentry plan.
(3) The licensee failed to maintain a policy of professional liability insurance pursuant to K.S.A. 40-3402, and amendments thereto, and to pay the premium surcharges pursuant to K.S.A. 40-3404, and amendments thereto.
(i) Upon successful completion of the approved reentry plan, the physician shall be granted an active license.
(j) A reentry active license shall not be issued to a physician who ceased practice as a result of revocation of that individual’s license or voluntary surrender of the license in lieu of formal proceedings.
