Notice of 2012 WTAP Program Enrollment

The Kansas Department of Agriculture will accept applications under the Water Right Transition Assistance Pilot Project Program (WTAP) during the fall 2012 enrollment period, beginning October 1 and ending November 15.

WTAP is a voluntary, incentive-based program that permanently retires privately held irrigation water rights in exchange for payment by the state of Kansas. It is intended to help restore aquifers and recover stream flows in critically depleted target areas. The 2012 Kansas Legislature extended WTAP until June 30, 2012, based on past results of the recent pilot project.

The target areas currently designated include Rattlesnake Creek Sub-basin, Prairie Dog Creek Basin, and six "high priority areas" of Northwest Kansas Groundwater Management District No. 4. The WTAP rules and regulations, target area maps, application forms and other details are posted on the Division of Conservation website at <http://www.ksda.gov/doc/>.

WTAP bids cannot exceed \$2,000 per acre-foot of the Historic Consumptive Water Use as calculated over the last 10 years of actual annual water use of the water rights proposed for acceptance. Applications to accept partial water rights also can be considered. The award of WTAP grants for water right retirements is based on a competitive bidding process. Applications that propose a financial contribution from a local entity may increase the priority of an application.

A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 40-1-20. Same; subrogation clause prohibited for certain coverages. This amendment to the existing regulation would clarify that the prohibition against subrogation clauses in health insurance policies applies to all health insurers and not just those identified as companies. This clarification is consistent with longstanding practice.

Because current practice is consistent with this clarification there is no economic impact on health insurers.

Similarly, there will be no economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department, consumers, small businesses or other governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 40-1-50. Insurance scoring; definitions; requirements. This amendment to the existing regulation would specify the manner in which insurers would notify consumers about their right for an annual review of risks and rates under the Kansas insurance score act.

Although the notice requirement is imposed by statute, this proposed amendment would require a change in the manner of providing that notice, which might have a minimal impact upon affected insurers.

There will be no significant economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department, consumers, small businesses or other governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 40-1-52. Written notice to claimants of payment of claim in third-party settlements. This proposed regulation would require insurers to notify claimants in third-party liability matters if settlement payments of \$5,000 or more are delivered to the claimant's lawyer or other representative.

The requirement to provide this notice would have a minimal impact on insurers not already providing this notice and no impact on insurers who already provide this notice.

There will be no economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department, consumers, small businesses or other governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 40-2-14a. This proposed amendment would adopt by reference the updated version of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Suitability in Annuity Transactions Model Regulation. Specifically, KID has adopted a policy dated June 6, 2012, that would modify the model regulation to be consistent with Kansas law.

There should be minimal economic impact on insurers and insurance agents. Specifically, the amendment requires agents to have additional annuity training and requires insurers to develop a system of supervision, including ensuring that agents meet the additional training requirement. Any economic impact will be mitigated by the reduced compliance costs resulting from greater uniformity with standards in other states.

There will be little or no economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department, consumers, small businesses or other governmental agencies.

The anticipated economic impact of K.A.R. 132-3-1 is positive for Kansas. The regulation provides the framework for the 911 Coordinating Council to secure grant dollars through the federal government. Though the federal-grant requirements necessitate matching funds, the proposed regulation will help ensure that the council only pursues federal funds when matching funds are available. The only impact on other government entities would be at the federal level and only if the 911 Coordinating Council pursues federal grants. The economic impact on other government agencies or private businesses or individuals is minimal or nonexistent. This regulation should have a positive impact on service providers, as any secured grant dollars will be monies that providers will avoid.

There is no environmental impact with this regulation.

The average discharge from the WWTF is 2.2 mgd. API sludge and primary DAF sludge are directed to a sludge handling system for recovery, reprocessing, or for use in the coker petroleum refining process unit. Sludge from crude oil tanks is treated on a case-by-case basis and may be sent to a hazardous waste disposal facility, the coker or another KDHE-approved disposal method. Waste activated sludge (WAS) and surface skimmings from the secondary and final clarifiers are commingled with raw water presedimentation solids in the aerobic digester/storage basin. The combined sludge is dewatered by centrifuge and transported to a landfill and the filtrate is returned to the CMAS basins. Alternatively, wastewater residuals have the potential to be land applied. Three earthen bio-solids ponds may be used for solids settling and dewatering as part of a wastewater residuals management system. The proposed permit contains limits for total suspended solids, biochemical oxygen demand, chemical oxygen demand, oil and grease, phenolic compounds, ammonia, sulfides, total chromium, hexavalent chromium, chlorides, fluoride, whole effluent toxicity and pH, as well as monitoring of sulfates, temperature, priority pollutants and effluent flow.
