Notice Concerning Kansas/Federal Water Pollution Control Permits and Applications

This facility generates electric power with high-pressure steam produced by three coal-fired generating units. Fuel oil can be used as an alternative. Surface water from the Kansas River or from alluvial wells is conveyed into storage lakes. Lime-softened water is used for the flue gas desulfurization (FGD) system, cooling tower make-up water, service water uses and is treated further for use as boiler make-up water. This action consists of issuance of a new wastewater discharge permit for discharge into the Kansas River for the cooling tower blowdown with either recycle use of the treated flue gas desulfurization wastewater as make-up water for the cooling towers or for commingling of the treated flue gas wastewater with the cooling towers blowdown prior to discharge. This permit will replace the existing NPDES/Kansas water pollution control permit No. I-

KS67-PO02 upon construction of additional treatment of the flue gas desulfurization (FGD) wastewater through a constructed wetland treatment system and modifications needed to reuse the FGD wastewater for cooling tower make-up water or commingle the treated FGD wastewater with the cooling tower blowdown and discharge the cooling tower blowdown or the commingled wastewater directly into the Kansas River. The permit will also continue the infrequent discharge from the Bottom Ash Lake into Lost Creek, but due to modifications proposed to utilize the Bottom Ash Lake water for FGD limestone preparation the changes are expected to reduce the frequency and increase the quality of water discharging periodically from the Bottom Ash Lake. The proposed permit contains limits for total residual oxidant, sulfates, total recoverable selenium and copper, mercury, total suspended solids, oil and grease, chloride, whole effluent toxicity and pH, as well as monitoring of fluoride, other heavy metals, priority pollutants, lake freeboard, discharge time and effluent flow. The permittee is also under consent order 08-E-0026 amended. Under this consent order, the permittee has provided, and KDHE has accepted, study results to determine feasible and cost-effective wastewater treatment and disposal alternatives to minimize pollution to the receiving streams. The permit and amended consent order require Westar to meet final limitations and have a permanent KDHE-accepted wastewater treatment and disposal alternative constructed and in operation by June 1, 2014.

Persons wishing to comment on the draft documents and/or permit applications must submit their comments in writing to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment if they wish to have the comments considered in the decision-making process. Comments should be submitted to the attention of the Livestock Waste Management Section for agricultural-related draft documents or applications, or to the Technical Services Section for all other permits, at the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Water, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 420, Topeka, 66612-1367.

All comments regarding the draft documents or application notices received on or before April 27 will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this public notice. Please refer to the appropriate Kansas document number (KS-AG-13-070/075, KS-Q-13-044,) and name of the applicant/permittee when preparing comments.

After review of any comments received during the public notice period, the secretary of health and environment will issue a determination regarding final agency action on each draft document/application. If response to any draft document/application indicates significant public interest, a public hearing may be held in conformance with K.A.R. 28-16-61 (28-46-21 for UIC).

All draft documents/applications and the supporting information including any comments received are on file and may be inspected at the offices of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Water. Opinion No. 2013-01

Written March 20, 2013, to Rodney T. (Tom) Lohff, Pittsburg.

Synopsis: Under the facts presented, a state employee may contract to provide training for addiction counselors either individually or as an employee of a business entity if, (1) the training is different from their state duties, (2) no substantial involvement in the making of any contract exists between the state and the state employee or the business entity, (3) confidential information obtained by the employee's official duties is not used for financial gain of the employee or another, and (4) no direct participation by the employee in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of the business entity.

Dear Mr. Lohff:

This opinion is in response to your request for an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission (Commission), concerning application of the state conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction is limited to the applicability of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and the Commission's opinion does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

Factual Statement

You are currently employed as a Program Consultant II with the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS). You conduct site visits for alcohol and drug programs that are licensed by the state to provide services.

The Kansas Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board (BSRB) and other regulations require addiction counselors receive training in specific courses every two years. You plan to present such training courses, either as a private individual or as an employee of a private agency when not in the course of your employment with KDADS on your own time.

Question

The question you pose is whether it is permissible for you, either as a self-employed individual or an employee for a business entity, to present training for addiction counselors that may work for alcohol and drug programs that you are responsible for inspecting under your current employment with the State of Kansas.

Analysis and Opinion

Four statutes apply to your query: K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 46-233, which concerns state agencies contracting with employee's businesses; K.S.A. 46-235, which governs restrictions on compensation of state officers and employees; K.S.A. 46-241, which involves the use of confidential information gained in employment with the State; and K.S.A. 46-286, which prohibits participation by a state employee in the licensure, inspection, or regulation of a busi-

ness in which the state employee holds a position. Each will be addressed in turn.

K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 46-233 provides, in pertinent part:

(a)(1) No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed . . .

(e)(2) "Substantially involved in the preparation or participate in the making of a contract" means having approved or disapproved a contract or having provided significant factual or specific information or advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract.

In order to comply with this statute you may not, in your capacity with KDADS, be substantially involved in preparing any negotiated contract or participate in the making of any negotiated contract between the State and any business entity that may employ you to provide training to addiction counselors or others. Should the occasion arise that KDADS would contract with such business entity, you must abstain from any participation on behalf of KDADS in the making of that contract.

K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 46-235 provides:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees.

Pursuant to this statute, a state employee may not receive compensation for providing services which include duties that he or she is obligated to perform as part of his or her official duties as a state employee.

K.S.A. 46-241 provides:

No state officer or employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of his or her official duties in order to further his or her own economic interest or those of any other person.

This section is self-explanatory. Confidential information obtained during your official duties with the State may not be used for your financial gain or the financial gain of another.

K.S.A. 46-286 provides, in pertinent part:

(a) No state officer or employee in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

Because KDADS is involved in the licensing of alcohol and drug programs to provide services and you conduct site visits as part of KDADS regulation of alcohol and drug programs, you would not be able to provide training as an employee of a business entity that is regulated by KDADS if you are directly involved with the regulation.

In conclusion, you may not be substantially involved in the making of a contract between your employer,

(continued)

KDADS, and your business or a business where you are otherwise employed. Pursuant to K.S.A. 46-235, so long as your work is different from your current State duties, you would not be prohibited from providing training necessary for specific training to addiction counselors or others either as an individual or as an employee of a business entity. Confidential information obtained during your official duties with the State may not be used for your financial gain or the financial gain of another. Finally, you may not participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of a business entity that employs you to provide training.

Notice of Intent to Amend the Medicaid State Plan

Under the Medicaid program, the state of Kansas participates in the Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE). The state pays PACE organizations a monthly capitated rate based on the age and eligibility of PACE participants. The Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) in conjunction with the Department of Health and Environment, Division of Health Care Finance (DHCF), the single state Medicaid agency, administers the PACE program.

As required by 42 CFR 447.205, the secretary of KDADS and the director of DHCF are publishing the capitated rates for PACE for calendar year 2013, the methodology underlying the establishment of the capitated rates, and justification for the rates. KDADS and DHCF are also providing notice of the state's intent to submit proposed amendments to the Medicaid State Plan to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) on or before March 31, 2013.

I. Methodology for Establishing PACE Rates

In accordance with 42 CFR 460.182 the state pays each PACE organization a prospective monthly capitated amount for each Medicaid participant. The capitated amounts have been negotiated between the PACE organization and the state. The capitated amounts are less than the amount that would otherwise have been paid under the state plan if the participants were not enrolled under the PACE program. The capitated rates take into account the comparative frailty of PACE participants and are

fixed regardless of changes in the participant's health status.

To ensure compliance with the requirements of 42 CFR 460.182, the state retained the services of the Optumas actuarial firm. Optumas provided the state with certified upper payment limits for four regions of Kansas and three rate categories. A copy of the certification letter provided by Optumas is available upon request by writing the secretary of KDADS at 503 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, 66603. Rates for each PACE organization were negotiated based on upper payment limits established by Optumas.

Rates for each individual PACE organization were determined by a weighted average based on the number of member months the PACE organization is projected to provide to members from each rate region. The projected distribution between regions will be agreed upon by the state and each PACE Organization. A retrospective adjustment will be made to the rates for each PACE organization whose actual distribution between rate regions produces a weighted average rate that varies by 5 percent or more above or below the rate produced by the projected distribution.

Notice of Revised Nursing Facility Medicaid Rates

Under the Medicaid program, 42 U.S.C. 1396 et seq., the state of Kansas pays nursing facilities, nursing facilities for mental health, and hospital long-term care units (hereafter collectively referred to as nursing facilities) a daily rate for care provided to residents who are eligible for Medicaid benefits. The secretary of the Department for Aging and Disability Services administers the nursing facility program, which includes hospital long-term care units, and the nursing facility for mental health program. The secretary acts on behalf of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Health Care Finance, the single state Medicaid agency. As required by 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(13), as amended by Section 4711 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, P.L. No. 105-33, 101 Stat. 251, 507-08 (August 5, 1997), the secretary of the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) is publishing revised nursing facility Medicaid rates, methodology underlying the revision of the nursing facility rates, and the justifications for those rates. KDADS is also providing notice of the state's intent to submit amendments to the Medicaid State Plan to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) on or before June 30, 2013.

I. Methodology Used to Calculate Medicaid Per Diem Rates for Nursing Facilities

In general, the state uses a prospective, cost-based, facility-specific rate-setting methodology to calculate nursing facility Medicaid per diem rates. Since the implementation of the Quality Care Assessment effective July 1, 2010, the state has made quarterly lump-sum payments to pass-through the Medicaid share of the assessment. The state is now converting this pass-through to a per diem that will be added to the facility per diem rates. The state's revised pass-through methodology is described in Attachment 4.19D, Part I, Subpart U.

Copies of the documents and authorities containing the state's rate-setting methodology are available upon written request. A request for copies will be treated as a request for public records under the Kansas Open Records Act, K.S.A. 45-215 et seq. The state will charge a fee for copies. Attachment 4.19D, Part I, Subpart U

To compensate providers for increased expenses incurred due to the quality care assessment, a per diem pass-through will be determined and paid to each Med-

icaid provider. The per diem will be added to the nursing facility Medicaid per diem rate. The quality care assessment pass-through will not be subject to cost center limits or the 85 percent occupancy rule.

1) Qualifying Providers

All providers currently enrolled in the Medicaid program will be eligible for the quality care assessment pass-through per diem.

2) Per Diem Pass-Through Calculation

The quality care assessment pass-through per diem will be determined by multiplying the quarterly quality care assessment paid by each qualifying provider by four to determine an annualized assessment expense. The annualized assessment expense will be divided by the total resident days from the calendar year cost report preceding the start of the fiscal year. For example, during fiscal year 2014 (July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014), the resident day total from the calendar year 2012 cost report will be used to determine the per diem pass-through.

For providers filing a projected cost report the projected resident day total will be used to initially calculate the pass-through per diem. The per diem pass-through will be adjusted retroactively for an historical cost report covering the projection period.

II. Revised Medicaid Per Diem Rates for Kansas Nursing Facilities

The per diem rates are posted on the KDADS provider website at http://www.aging.ks.gov/AdultCareHomes/RateSetting/RateSetting_index.html. They are also available by writing the nursing facility reimbursement manager at 503 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, 66603.

III. Justifications for the Final Rates

1. The final rates are calculated according to the rate-setting methodology in the Kansas Medicaid State Plan and pending amendments thereto.

2. The final rates are calculated according to a methodology which satisfies the requirements of K.S.A. 39-708c(x) and the KHPA regulations in K.A.R. Article 30-10 implementing that statute and applicable federal law.

3. Estimated annual aggregate expenditures in the Medicaid nursing facility services payment program will not change since the per diem pass-through simply replaces the lump-sum pass-through.

IV. Notice of Intent to Amend the Medicaid State Plan

The state intends to submit proposed Medicaid State Plan amendments to CMS on or before June 30, 2013.

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-296. 18837 Just One More Keno promotion.

(a) During the term of this promotion, for every single purchase of \$10 or more of Kansas lottery online Keno at the Just One More participating Kansas lottery retailer, the lottery terminal shall automatically produce an entry voucher to be given to the customer as an entry form into a drawing. Rules applicable to this drawing are contained in K.A.R. 111-2-296 through 111-2-297 and K.A.R. 111-3-1, *et seq.*

(b) The term of this promotion shall be 5:00 a.m. November 4, 2012, through November 19, 2012 at 2:00 a.m.

(c) During the term of this promotion, a drawing receptacle for the deposit of the player entry vouchers shall be provided by the lottery at the participating retailer location.

(d) After the term of this promotion has ended, three entries and three alternate entries shall be drawn by the Kansas lottery from the entries deposited in the drawing receptacle at the participating retailer location. The participating store shall have three entries selected as winners and three entries selected as alternate winners.

(e) Drawing prizes at the participating retailer location shall include a poker table and chip set, a leather jacket, and lottery promotional items of the Kansas lottery's choice.

(f) For the participating retailer location, the winner of the first ticket drawn shall win the poker table and chip set. The winner of the second ticket drawn shall win the leather jacket. The winner of the third ticket drawn shall receive promotional items of the Kansas lottery's choice.

(g) The drawing shall be held at Kansas lottery headquarters any time between November 19, 2012, through November 23, 2012. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-2-297. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the Just One More Keno promotion shall be accomplished as follows:

(1) During the term of this promotion, customers shall receive an entry voucher with any single purchase of \$10 or more worth of Keno on a single ticket to use as an entry to complete and put into the drawing receptacle provided.

(2) The purchaser must complete the information on the entry voucher in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on each entry voucher.

(continued)

(3) The completed entry voucher must be placed into the designated drawing receptacle provided at the participating retailer location no later than November 19, 2012 at 2:00 a.m.

(4) The holder of the entry voucher is not required to personally attend the drawing or be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner.

(5) The drawing shall be conducted at the Kansas lottery headquarters office after the entry deadline for the promotion. Three entries and three alternate entries shall be drawn by lottery personnel for each participating retailer location.

(6) Only entry vouchers that were produced at the participating Kansas lottery retailer with a qualified purchase during the stated period of time may be entered into the drawing.

(7) Entry vouchers must be deposited in the drawing receptacle at the participating retailer location where the entrant made the qualifying purchase to enter the drawing.

(b) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make, but each person may only win once.

(c) All eligible entries which are deposited into the drawing receptacle no later than November 19, 2012, at 2:00 a.m. shall be entered into the drawing.

(d) All entries deposited on or before November 19, 2012, at 2:00 a.m. shall be secured by the store manager at the participating retailer location. A designated lottery official shall pick up the entries which have been secured by the store manager and shall transport said entries to Kansas lottery headquarters. Upon arrival at Kansas lottery headquarters, the designated lottery official shall deliver the entries to Kansas lottery security personnel who shall secure the entries until the drawing is conducted.

(e) Eligible entrants in the promotion must be 18 years of age or older. Employees of the participating retailer location are not eligible to enter the promotion.

(f) Completing the information on the entry form and entering the voucher into any drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn.

(g) The Kansas lottery reserves the right to change prizes at its discretion. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

Article 4.—INSTANT GAMES AND DRAWINGS

111-4-3225. "\$100,000 Crossword" instant ticket lottery game number 527. (a) The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "\$100,000 Crossword" commencing on or after November 1, 2012. The rules for this game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-3225.

(b) The "play symbols" for this game are as follows: A - B - C - D - E - F - G - H - I - J - K - L - M - N - O - P - Q - R - S - T - U - V - W - X - Y - Z - and symbol of a money bag. There are no "play symbol captions" in this game puzzle.

(c) For this game, a play symbol shall appear in each of 20 play spots within the "YOUR LETTERS" play area, in each of five play spots within the "BONUS WORD"

play area, and a variable number of times within the crossword puzzle grid.

(d) The ticket numbers in each book of tickets in this game shall start with 000 and end with 029.

(e) The price of instant tickets sold by a retailer for this game shall be \$10.00 each.

(f) The "\$100,000 Crossword" game consists of two separate crossword puzzles, with four separate play areas. The play areas include "YOUR LETTERS," "DOUBLER PUZZLE" (Puzzle 1), "MEGA PUZZLE" (Puzzle 2), and a "BONUS WORD." The player will scratch the "YOUR LETTERS" play area to reveal 20 "YOUR LETTERS." The player will then match each "YOUR LETTER" with the corresponding letters in each crossword puzzle and the "BONUS WORD" by removing the translucent scratch-off material covering the matching letter. A player wins according to the prize legend associated with each crossword puzzle. Each puzzle plays separately.

In the "DOUBLER PUZZLE" (Puzzle 1), if the player scratches three or more completed words, the player wins the corresponding prize in the prize legend. If one of the winning combinations shown in the prize legend has a completed word with a "MONEY BAG" symbol, the player wins double the prize. Only the highest corresponding prize can be won. (g) To qualify as a complete word to win a prize in this game, the words revealed must meet the following requirements:

- (1) must contain at least three letters;
- (2) cannot be formed diagonally, run right to left or from bottom to top;
- (3) must appear in an unbroken horizontal or vertical string of letters in the "crossword" puzzle;
- (4) an unbroken string of letters cannot be interrupted by a black space and must contain every single letter square between two black spaces;
- (5) every single letter in the unbroken string must be revealed in "YOUR LETTERS," and be included to form a word; and

(6) the three small letters outside the squares in the "YOUR LETTERS" area are for validation purposes and cannot be used to play "\$100,000 Crossword."

KEEPIN' IT IN KANSAS DRAWING

111-7-249. Name of drawing. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a drawing entitled "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing," and will accept entries on and after November 4, 2012, beginning at 5 a.m., and ending on February 26, 2013, at 5:00 p.m. as specified in these rules. The drawing will be held at a time and location designated by the executive director of the Kansas lottery. Rules applicable to this drawing are contained in K.A.R. 111-7-249 through 111-7-254 and K.A.R. 111-3-1, *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-7-250. Definitions. (a) All definitions contained in the Kansas lottery act (K.S.A. 74-8701 *et seq.*) and lottery regulations are hereby incorporated by reference and govern unless otherwise indicated.

(b) "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" means the act of drawing prizes conducted by the Kansas lottery at the time and date described in these rules in which participants are selected to win various prizes as described in these rules.

(c) "Entry form" means any valid entry form generated at a Kansas lottery selling terminal as the result of a purchase of \$5 or more on a single ticket of the Kansas lottery online Super Kansas Cash game during the term of this promotion.

(d) "Receptacle" or "drum" means a container in which completed entry forms are placed and from which the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" entries are drawn. Receptacles or drums may be sealable and shall be ca-

pable of being mixed or rotated for the purpose of ensuring random distribution.

(e) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing where the person drawing the winning ticket from the receptacle or drum wears a long-sleeved shirt with sleeve rolled up above the elbow, a short-sleeved shirt (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a no-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm and looks away from the drawing drum or receptacle while drawing. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-7-251. Prize. (a) Each of the 25 winners drawn in the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" shall receive a \$2,500 gift card good for merchandise at any of the Rally House & Kansas Sampler locations or online at the websites of rallyhouse.com or kansassampler.com. Each prize package includes mandatory state and federal income withholding taxes. Each prize package is valued at approximately \$3,571.

(b) All prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law.

(c) The Kansas lottery may, at its sole and absolute discretion, substitute a prize of approximate equal value. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-7-252. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" to be conducted on or about March 1, 2013, shall be accomplished as follows:

(1) For every single purchase of \$5 or more of Kansas lottery online "Super Kansas Cash" tickets, an entry form will generate automatically on the online terminal where the ticket was sold. The selling clerk at the retailer location shall give the entry form to the person who purchased the ticket.

(2) The holder of the entry form must complete the information on the entry form in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on an entry form entered.

(3) Players may deposit entry forms for the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" beginning on and after November 4, 2012, at any Kansas lottery event or location at which the lottery has specifically designated a receptacle for deposit of said entries until 5:00 p.m. on February 26, 2013.

(4) Entries other than those entered at Kansas lottery events or locations as identified in these rules shall be mailed with proper postage to "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing," P. O. Box 8099, Topeka, Kansas 66608-0099. Mailed entries must be received by the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, February 26, 2013. More than one entry may be mailed in one envelope.

(5) The holder of the entry form is not required to personally attend the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" or be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner.

(b) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make, but a person may only win one time in the drawing.

(c) Only valid entry forms which are mailed to the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing," at the above-stated address with proper postage and received by the morning mail pickup in Topeka, Kansas, on Tuesday, February 26, 2013, and valid entry forms entered into any other recep-

tacle designated by the lottery as provided in the rules herein shall be eligible for the drawing. All entries so mailed or deposited shall be secured by the lottery until the drawing is conducted.

(d) Eligible entrants in the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" must be 18 years of age or older.

(e) Completing the information on the entry form and entering the entry form into the drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn.

(f) The Kansas lottery shall not be responsible for any lost, destroyed, mutilated, unreadable, or altered entries into the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing." Players enter this contest at their own risk. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-7-253. Selection of winners. The following process shall be used for the selection of the winners in the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing:"

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" entries at the United States Post Office Box 8099, in Topeka, Kansas, with the final pick up at the Topeka post office in the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, February 26, 2013. Following the morning mail pickup on Tuesday, February 26, 2013, the envelopes containing mailed entries will be transported to lottery headquarters and opened by lottery personnel. All mailed entries shall then be placed in the drawing receptacle or drum designated by the lottery for the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" entries.

(b) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" entries deposited at any Kansas lottery event or location, at which the lottery specifically designated a receptacle for deposit of said entries, periodically throughout the drawing. The final pick up at any open receptacles shall be immediately after the close of the Kansas lottery claims centers in Topeka, Kansas, and Great Bend, Kansas, at 5:00 p.m. on February 26, 2013. All entries deposited at a designated receptacle for deposit of said entries shall be transported to lottery headquarters, if necessary, and opened by lottery personnel and placed in the drawing receptacle or drum designated for deposit of said entries by the lottery.

(c) The drawing shall be held at a location determined by the executive director of the Kansas lottery and shall be open to the public with lottery security personnel present. The drawing shall be audio and video taped.

(d) At the drawing on or about March 1, 2013, lottery security personnel will be present with the person designated by the executive director to perform the drawing. Prior to the drawing, if a drum is used, the drum shall be sealed and the contents mixed by rotating the drum at least 10 times. If a receptacle other than a drum is used, the contents shall be thoroughly mixed with a shovel or by other means.

(e) The designated individual shall then unseal the drum, if a drum is used, and using the bare-arm technique, while looking away, remove 25 entry forms from the receptacle or drum, which shall be marked as number one through 25, in the order drawn. The person(s) whose

(continued)

name(s) appear on the entries drawn shall be the winners of the prize identified in these rules, subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules.

(f) After the prize entries have been drawn on or about March 1, 2013, and the entries have been verified as valid, eight more valid entries will be drawn, one at a time, which entries drawn will serve as alternate entries. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A, 2A, 3A, 4A, 5A, 6A, 7A, and 8A. The winners shall have until 5:00 p.m. on the thirtieth day following the date of the drawing to present the fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters. If the thirtieth day following the mailing of a claim form to any winner falls on a weekend or holiday, the thirtieth day shall be extended to the next business day. If a prize winner cannot be located or is declared ineligible, or fails to timely present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters, the prize will be awarded to the next alternate ticket selected in the order drawn. The alternate winner process shall be repeated until the prize is properly claimed or until such time as no alternate winners remain, whichever occurs first.

(g) The Kansas lottery security official present shall review each entry drawn to determine the validity of the entry into the "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" in accordance with these regulations. If it is a valid entry and the name is legible, the event manager and the security person present shall record the name of the winner and the prize won. The prize winner shall be given or sent a prize claim form to be completed and returned as set forth in these rules.

(h) If any entry drawn is determined to be ineligible, it shall be discarded by the security person present and another entry drawn. This procedure will be repeated until the required number of apparently eligible selections is obtained.

(i) Only qualified entry forms described in these rules are eligible for the drawing.

(j) All entries remaining in the drum or receptacle after the winners and alternates have been selected, and all entries not received in compliance with these rules shall be destroyed pursuant to K.A.R. 111-3-34. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-7-254. Certification of drawing. (a) The "Keepin' It In Kansas Drawing" shall be personally observed by a member of the Kansas lottery security department and a member of the Kansas lottery marketing department or other person or persons designated by the executive director of the lottery.

(b) Upon completion of the drawing, the security official and the event manager shall issue a report to the executive director, certifying that the name of each prize winner is correct, and that to the best of their knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in selecting the prize winners. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

Article 401.—NORTHEAST GAMING ZONE

111-401-172. Name of the game; rules and regulations. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a lottery facility

game at the Hollywood Casino in Kansas City, Kansas, entitled "EZ Pai Gow Poker" beginning on or after November 1, 2012.

The rules and regulations for the game of "EZ Pai Gow Poker" are contained in K.A.R. 111-401-172 through 111-401-177, and applicable generic rules are contained in K.A.R. 111-201-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-401-173. Object of game. The "EZ Pai Gow Poker" is played with one deck of 53 cards, the back of which cards shall all be identical in appearance. Each deck of playing cards shall consist of 13 value cards (ace, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, jack, queen, and king) in each of four suits (hearts, spades, diamonds, and clubs), plus one joker. The object of the game is for a player to beat the dealer's hand by creating a high hand (five cards) and a low hand (two cards) that are higher in value than the dealer's hand. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-401-174. Definitions. The following definitions, when used in the Northeast Kansas Lottery Gaming Zone, when pertaining to the game of "EZ Pai Gow Poker" shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

(a) "Bank" or "banker" shall mean the house or the dealer.

(b) "Copy hand" shall mean either a two-card hand or a five-card hand of a player which is identical in rank to the corresponding two-card hand or five-card hand of the dealer.

(c) "Dynasty Bonus wager" shall mean a player's side wager that the outcome of the player's high hand will be of a certain qualifying poker rank.

(d) "Envy bonus" shall mean an additional fixed sum payoff made to a player who placed a bonus wager of at least \$5.00 when another player at the pai gow poker table is the holder of a premium qualifying poker hand. A player is entitled to multiple envy bonuses if more than one other player is the holder of a premium qualifying poker hand; provided, however, that a player is not entitled to an envy bonus for his or her own cards or the cards of the dealer.

(e) "EZ pai gow protection wager" shall mean a player's side wager that the outcome of the Player's seven card hand will be of a certain qualifying poker rank.

(f) "High hand" or "five-card hand" shall mean the five-card hand which is formed from the seven cards dealt at the game of pai gow poker so as to rank equal to or higher than the two-card low hand.

(g) "Luhn Tao Wheel" shall mean a hand consisting of a natural straight flush.

(h) "Natural" when referring to a hand in EZ pai gow poker shall mean a hand that does not utilize a joker.

(i) "Owner" shall mean the first seated player in a position.

(j) "Premium qualifying poker hand" shall mean a five-card or seven-card poker hand with a rank of four-of-a-kind or higher formed from the seven cards dealt to a player.

(k) "Push" shall mean a player loses or has a hand identical in rank to the dealer's hand on either the high hand or low hand, but wins on the remaining hand.

(l) "Qualifying poker hand" shall mean a five-card or seven-card poker hand with a rank of three-of-a-kind or higher formed from the seven cards dealt to a player.

(m) "Queen's Dragon wager" shall mean an optional wager that the dealer's seven-card hand consists of a pai gow poker hand with a queen as the highest ranking card.

(n) "Rank" or "ranking" shall mean the relative position of a card or group of cards.

(o) "Second highest" or "low hand" shall mean the two-card hand which is formed from the seven cards dealt at the game of pai gow poker so as to rank equal to or lower than the five-card high hand.

(p) "Set" or "setting the hands" shall mean the process of forming a high hand and low hand from the seven cards dealt.

(q) "Shadow" or "shadow wager" shall mean a wager another player is allowed to place behind the seated player's bet. A shadow bet must abide by table minimums and maximums. The seated player has complete jurisdiction over the decisions made when the cards are dealt. The shadow wager must never be stacked on top of the seated player's wager.

(r) "Suit" shall mean one of the four categories of cards, i.e., diamond, spade, club, or heart. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-401-175. Hand rankings. (a) The ranking of the cards used in EZ Pai Gow Poker, in order of highest to lowest rank, is ace, king, queen, jack, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, and 2. An ace may be used to complete a "straight flush" or a "straight" formed with a 2, 3, 4, and 5. Except as otherwise provided below, the joker is used and ranked as an ace. The ranking of hands, from highest to lowest, is:

(1) Five aces - a high hand consisting of the four "natural aces" in the deck with the joker played in the five-card hand.

(2) Royal flush - a high hand consisting of an ace, king, queen, jack, and 10 of the same suit with or without the joker in the five-card hand.

(3) Straight flush - a high hand consisting of five cards of the same suit in consecutive ranking, with the ranks of hands as follows:

(A) Ace, king, queen, jack, 10 is the highest ranking straight flush.

(B) Ace, 2, 3, 4, 5, is the second highest ranking straight flush.

(C) All other straight flush rankings will be determined by the highest card in the straight flush.

(4) Four-of-a-kind - a high hand consisting of four cards of the same rank with four aces being the highest and four 2's being the lowest.

(5) Full house - a high hand consisting of three-of-a-kind and a pair, with three aces with two kings being the highest and three 2's with two 3's being the lowest.

(6) Flush - a high hand consisting of five cards of the same suit.

(7) Straight - a high hand consisting of five cards of consecutive rank regardless of suit, with the rankings as follows:

(A) Ace, king, queen, jack, 10 is the highest ranking straight.

(B) Ace, 2, 3, 4, 5, is the second highest ranking straight.

(C) All other straight rankings will be determined by the highest card in the straight.

(8) Three-of-a-kind - a high hand consisting of three cards of the same rank regardless of suit.

(9) Two pair - a high hand consisting of two pairs of two cards of the same rank regardless of suit.

(10) One pair - a high hand consisting of two cards of the same rank regardless of suit.

(11) High card - a hand that does not encompass any of the hands above.

For purposes of setting the hands, a joker may be used as any card to complete a straight, a flush, a straight flush, or a royal flush.

(b) The following hand rankings are only applicable to pai-gow poker bonus wagers:

(1) Seven-card natural straight flush - a hand consisting of all seven of the player's cards in the same suit in consecutive ranking using no joker.

(2) Royal flush plus royal match - a high hand consisting of an ace, king, queen, jack, and 10 of the same suit in the five-card hand and a king and queen of the same suit in the two-card hand.

(3) Seven-card straight flush utilizing a joker - same as subsection (b)(1) above, except using the joker as one of the seven cards. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

111-401-176. Wagers. (a) Only players who are seated at the EZ pai gow poker table may touch his or her own cards.

(b) Shadow wagers are permitted.

(c) Prior to the first card being dealt for each round of play, each player at the game of EZ pai gow poker shall make a wager against the dealer. There are also three additional optional bonus bet wagers that, if placed, must be placed prior to the first card being dealt for each round to be active. Those additional optional bonus bet wagers are the dynasty bonus wager, the EZ pai gow protection wager, and the Queen's Dragon wager.

(1) The EZ pai gow poker shall win if the high hand of the player is higher in rank than the high hand of the dealer and the low hand of the player is higher in rank than the low hand of the dealer.

(2) If the optional bonus wagers are placed, the bonus wagers shall win if the player's or dealer's seven cards will form a qualifying poker hand, regardless of the manner in which the player set the high hand and the low hand.

(3) If the player has placed an optional bonus wager of \$5 (five dollars) or more, the envy bonus shall win when another player at the pai gow poker table is the holder of a premium qualifying poker hand.

(d) A pai gow poker wager made by a player is a push if:

(continued)

(1) The high hand of the player is higher in rank than the high hand of the dealer, but the low hand of the player is identical in rank to the low hand of the dealer (copy hand) or lower in rank than the low hand of the dealer, or

(2) The high hand of the player is identical in rank to the high hand of the dealer (copy hand) or lower in rank than the high hand of the dealer, but the low hand of the player is higher in rank than the low hand of the dealer.

(e) The queen's dragon wager is an optional wager that the dealer's seven-card hand consists of a pai gow poker hand with a queen as the highest ranking card. A queen's dragon wager will win if the dealer's seven-card hand consists of a pai gow poker hand with a queen as the highest ranking card and a queen's dragon wager will lose if the dealer's seven-card hand consists of anything else.

(f) After each round of play is complete, the dealer shall collect all losing wagers and pay off all winning wagers with the exception of any hands that are subject to income tax withholding and/or reporting, which are paid once the necessary documents are completed. Except as otherwise set forth herein, all winning pai gow poker wagers made in accordance with these rules shall be paid at odds of one to one.

(g) A winning pai gow poker wager shall be paid at odds of one to one except that in the event the dealer has a queen high pai gow hand, in which event all original pai gow wagers will push. Any optional bonus wager or wagers shall win if the player's or dealer's seven cards will form a qualifying poker hand.

(h) Any player who has made a pai gow poker wager may, at the same time, make a pai gow bonus wager by placing gaming chips in the area designed for a bonus wager at his or her betting position. A bonus wager shall be no less than \$1.00 and no more than the posted table maximum.

(i) Any player who makes a bonus wager of \$5.00 or more shall qualify to receive an envy bonus payment. The dealer shall place an envy bonus marker immediately in front of any bonus wager of \$5.00 or more.

(j) If a pai gow bonus wager has been made by one or more players, the dealer shall observe the following procedures:

(1) The cards of any player who has placed a bonus wager shall remain on the pai gow game table regardless of the outcome of his or her pai gow poker wager until removed in accordance with the provisions of (k)(2) or (k)(3) below; and,

(2) If any player has placed a bonus wager of \$5.00 or more, the cards of each player shall remain on the pai gow game table regardless of the outcome of his or her pai gow poker wager until removed in accordance with the provisions below.

(k) After settling the pai gow poker wager of a player who has placed a bonus wager, the dealer may rearrange the seven cards of the player to form the best possible hand and shall be ultimately responsible for creating such hand for purposes of the bonus wager. A joker may be used as any card to complete any straight, flush, straight flush or royal flush or other than a seven-card straight flush with no joker. If any player at the table has placed

a bonus wager of \$5.00 or more, the dealer may rearrange the cards of each player at the table regardless of whether that player has placed a bonus wager, and then proceed as follows:

(1) If the player does not have a qualifying pai gow poker hand, the dealer shall collect the bonus wagers, if applicable, and place the cards of the player in the discard rack; and,

(2) If the player has a qualifying pai gow poker hand, the dealer shall, if applicable, pay the winning bonus wager in accordance with the approved pay table and place the cards of the player in the discard rack.

(l) The dealer shall, starting from the right and moving counterclockwise around the table, settle with each player who has an envy bonus marker at his or her betting position or who has a bonus wager and a premium qualifying poker hand, as follows:

(1) If the player has an envy bonus marker, the dealer shall pay the player the appropriate envy bonus payment set forth by these rules and collect the envy bonus marker and place the cards of the player in the discard rack;

(2) If the player has a bonus wager and a premium qualifying poker hand, the dealer shall pay the winning bonus wager in accordance with the approved pay table and place the cards of the player in the discard rack; and,

(3) After all envy bonuses and premium qualifying poker hands are paid, the dealer shall collect the cards of any player who had a premium qualifying poker hand but did not place a bonus wager and place the cards of the player in the discard rack.

(m) All winning bonus and envy wagers made in accordance with these rules shall be paid at the following odds or in the following amounts, as applicable:

111-401-177. Play. (a) The starting position for the dealing of cards or the delivery of stacks of cards for the game of EZ pai gow poker may be determined in one of the two following manners:

(1) The dealer shall shake the pai gow poker shaker containing three dice at least three times so as to cause a random mixture of the dice, and then proceed as follows:

(A) The dealer shall then remove the lid covering the pai gow poker shaker, determine the total sum of the dots on the sides of the three dice facing upward, and announce the total;

(B) To determine the starting position, the dealer shall count counterclockwise around the table, with the position of the dealer considered number one, and continuing around the table with each betting position counted in order, including the dealer; regardless of whether there is a wager at the position, until the count matches the total sum announced; and,

(C) The dealer shall place the cover on the pai gow poker shaker and shake the shaker once. The pai gow poker shaker shall then be placed to the left of the dealer's rack.

(2) In the alternative the dealer may use a computerized random number generator to select and display a number from 1 through 7, inclusive. To determine the starting position, the dealer shall count counterclockwise around the table, with the position of the dealer considered number one, and continuing around the table with each betting position counted in order, including the dealer, regardless of whether there is a wager at the position, until the count matches the number displayed by the random number generator.

(b) After all players have set their hands and placed the cards on the table, the seven cards of the dealer shall be turned over and the dealer shall set his or her hands by arranging the cards into a high and low hand using the following rules:

(1) No pair - use the highest card in the high hand. Use the second and third highest cards in the low hand.

(2) One pair - always play the pair in the high hand.

(3) Two pair - always use this formula for pairs (the "two pair rule"):

(A) Any pair of 2, 3, 4, or 5 cards equals "low" pair;

(B) Any pair of 6, 7, 8, or 9 cards equals "medium" pair;

(C) Any pair of 10, jack, queen, or king cards equals "high" pair;

(D) Any pair of aces is always played as the high hand;

(E) With hands consisting of two "lows" or one "low" and one "medium," always split unless a king or higher ranking card can be played in the low hand;

(F) With hands consisting of two "medium" or one "medium" and one "high," always split unless an ace together with either a jack, queen or king can be played in the low hand;

(G) With hands consisting of one "medium" and one "high" or two "highs," always split; and,

(H) With hands consisting of two aces always split with any other pair.

(4) Three pair - Play the highest of the three pairs as the low hand.

(5) Three-of-a-kind - Always keep unless the cards are three aces, in which case one ace must be used with the next highest card as the low hand.

(6) Two three-of-a-kind - Play a pair of the highest ranking three-of-a-kind as the low hand.

(7) Straight, flush, straight flush, or royal flush - With a straight containing six or seven cards, a flush, a straight flush, or a royal flush, use the highest card or cards in the low hand. With a straight, a flush, a straight flush or a royal flush along with an additional pair, use the pair as the low hand keeping the straight, flush, straight flush or royal flush as the high hand. Break a straight, flush, straight flush or royal flush when having two pair (the "two pair rule" as set forth above applies). Choose a straight over a flush dependent on whichever gives the higher ranking low hand.

(8) Full House - Always split. If you have an additional pair, then play the highest of the two pair in the low hand.

(9) Four-of-a-kind - Apply the "two pair rule," (as set forth above) except that if you have an additional pair, use the pair in the low hand. Four aces always split unless you also have an additional pair of kings.

(10) Five aces - Keep only with a pair of kings. If you don't have a pair of kings, then split the aces.

(c) The dealer shall then place the two hands face up on the appropriate area of the layout.

(d) Once the dealer has set a high hand and a low hand, the dealer shall expose both hands of each player, starting from the right and proceeding counterclockwise around the table. The dealer shall compare the high and low hand of each player to the high and low hand of the dealer and shall announce if the pai gow poker wager of that player shall win, lose, or be considered a tie.

(e) All losing wagers shall be immediately collected by the dealer and put in the table games chip tray. A pai gow poker wager made by a player shall lose if:

(1) The high hand of the player is lower in rank than the high hand of the dealer and the low hand of the player is lower in rank than the low hand of the dealer;

(2) The high hand of the player is identical in rank to the high hand of the dealer or the low hand of the player is identical in rank to the low hand of the dealer (a copy hand) and the other hand of the player is identical in rank or lower in rank than the other hand of the dealer;

(3) The high hand of the player was not set so as to rank equal to or higher than the low hand of that player; or,

(4) The two hands of the player were not otherwise set correctly in accordance with the rules of the game.

(f) All hands that result in a winning pai gow poker wager shall remain face up on the layout. Winning wagers shall be paid as the dealer exposes the players' cards with the exception of the hands that require income tax withholding and/or reporting, which are paid once the necessary documents are completed.

(g) After a winning pai gow poker wager has been paid the dealer shall then, if applicable, pay the winning bonus wagers of that player. Before paying a winning bonus wager, the dealer shall, if necessary, reset the player's high hand and low hand to form the hand type yielding the highest bonus payout to which the player is entitled. The dealer shall then collect the cards from that player.

(h) All cards collected by the dealer shall be picked up in order and placed in the discard rack in such a way that

(continued)

they can be readily arranged to reconstruct each hand in case of a question or dispute.

(i) The following irregularities or invalid roll of dice shall apply:

(1) If the dealer uncovers the pai gow poker shaker and all three dice do not land flat on the bottom of the shaker, the dealer shall call a "No roll" and re-shake the dice;

(2) If the dealer uncovers the pai gow poker shaker and a die or dice fall out of the shaker, the dealer shall call a "no roll" and re-shake the dice;

(3) A card drawn in error without its face being exposed shall be used as though it was the next card from the shoe;

(4) If the dealer is dealt an incorrect number of cards, all hands shall be void and the cards reshuffled;

(5) If the dealer does not set his or her hands in the manner specified above, the hands must be reset in accordance with this submission and the round of play completed;

(6) If an automated card shuffling device is being used and the device jams, stops shuffling during a shuffle, or fails to complete a shuffle cycle, the cards shall be re-shuffled;

(7) If an automated dealing shoe is being used and the device jams, stops dealing cards, or fails to deal all cards during a round of play, the round of play shall be void, and the cards shall be removed from the device and re-shuffled with any cards already dealt; and,

(8) If cards become soiled in the course of play and the dealer finds that a card is unsuitable for use, a table games floor supervisor will bring a substitute card from the card reserve in the pit stand and the unsuitable card is placed in a sealed envelope or container. The table games floor supervisor will maintain the envelope in a secure place within the pit until collection by security personnel. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)

cards ("stack"). Two (2) stacks will be issued to a Midi-Baccarat table. When the first stack is ready to be used for play the dealer will insert that stack into the automatic shuffling device. After the first stack has been shuffled, the dealer will remove the cards from the automatic shuffling device, offer the cards to be cut as set forth in section (b) herein, and then insert the cards into the shoe to be dealt. When the second stack is ready to be used for play the dealer will insert that stack into the automatic shuffling device where the cards will be shuffled and then stored until the shoe no longer contains any cards from the first stack. When the shoe no longer contains any cards from the first stack, the dealer will remove the second stack from the automated shuffling device and offer the cards to be cut as set forth in section (b) herein, and then insert the cards into the shoe to be dealt. After all cards from both stacks have been used this procedure shall be repeated as necessary.

(b) Prior to the first card being dealt the stack will be cut by placing a cut card into the stack the equivalent of a minimum of approximately one-fourth of the stack from either end of the stack, as determined by the dealer. Once the stack has been cut the cards will be placed in the shoe such that the cards above the cut card are placed below the last card in the stack.

(c) Each card shall be used only once, after which use it is removed from all further play and placed into a container specifically designated for such purpose.

(d) After the cards are placed into the shoe, the dealer will then draw the first card out of the shoe (the "burn card"), turn it face up on the table, and continue to draw from the shoe, face down, the number of cards equal to the point value of the burn card. All cards so drawn are then discarded (burned). (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-16-12, Oct. 17, 2012.)
