Request for Applications for FTA Programs

The Kansas Department of Transportation, Office of Public Transportation is accepting applications for the following Federal Transit Administration (FTA) programs:

- U.S.C. 49-5310 — Specialized Transportation for the Elderly and Disabled
- U.S.C. 49-5311 — General Public Transportation in Non-urbanized Areas

This application is to fund agency needs for state fiscal year 2017 (July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017). The application is required annually from all KDOT-funded 5310 and 5311 transit provider agencies including those not requesting capital and/or operating expenses.

Please Note: The application process for state fiscal year 2017 has changed. Be sure to read this entire notice for important details on how to apply for funding. Application packets will no longer be accepted by mail.

The purpose of the U.S.C. 49-5310 program is to provide funds to support private nonprofit corporations and authorized governments to provide transportation services to meet the special needs of the elderly and persons with disabilities. Federal funding under this program is available for capital expenditures only. State funding is available for operating expenses with the maximum award set by KDOT.

The purpose of the U.S.C. 49-5311 program is to provide funds to support rural and non-urbanized (cities less than 50,000 population) public transportation projects. The goal of the U.S.C. 49-5311 program is to provide services to the general public on an equal opportunity basis. Funds can be used for either operating or capital expenses.

The state funding for urban and rural public transportation for state fiscal year 2017 is budgeted at \$11 million.

Applicants for 5310 and 5311 funds must be local units of government, Indian tribes, or private nonprofit organizations registered with the Kansas Secretary of State to do business in Kansas. In addition, all applicants must be an active member in good standing of their coordinated transit district (CTD) in order to receive funding. Those agencies applying for funds in the metropolitan areas of Kansas City, Lawrence, Topeka and Wichita need to contact their respective metropolitan planning organization (MPO) to ensure that their application request is included in the MPO's transportation improvement program (TIP).

New Application Process:

The Office of Public Transportation is currently implementing a new grants management system that will streamline applying for new funding as well as make required reporting for agencies in its programs much easier.

To that end, all agencies, new or returning, must request funding application materials by emailing the Office of Public Transportation at PTAPPS@ksdot.org. **This is the only way to receive an application, and this will be the only way to sign up for training and to gain access to the new system.** Your email should include what

program or programs you are applying to, the full legal name of your organization, the full name, title and contact information for your agency's primary representative, including email and phone. Please include the name, title, email address and phone number of any other agency representatives that will require system training. Once you receive your application packet via email from the Office of Public Transportation, fill it out at your convenience and then hold on to it — **do not send your application back to KDOT.** One of the main goals of the new system is to eliminate the need for application packages to be mailed in to the Office of Public Transportation. You will need the information you compile in your packet to complete your application online.

The Office of Public Transportation is in the process of establishing a combination of regional meetings and online webinar training sessions through its new grants management software company, Panther International. Upon receipt of your email request and within three weeks of October 1, 2015, the Office of Public Transportation will notify you of your training options. This training is mandatory for each applicant agency and it is where you will receive your access information for the new system. You will be quickly trained on how to complete and submit your funding application online as well as how to submit your monthly ridership and expense reports. The Office of Public Transportation understands that the process for applying for funding is very different this year, and as such it has **extended the deadline for application submission to December 16, 2015.** The CTD and KDOT contact lists will remain available online at <http://www.ksdot.org/burTransPlan/pubtrans/index.asp>. Any potential applicants that do not have Internet access can request an application by contacting the KDOT Public Transit Office at 785-296-4907.

Once provided, applications must indicate whether the request is for replacement vehicles, an expansion of services currently provided, a new start application, or if the application is for the funding of only operating assistance. "New start" is defined as any proposed service that was not previously in existence. "Expansion" is defined as adding transit service to areas not already receiving services (for example: providing services to new locations or adding evening and weekend service).

KDOT has developed selection criteria to be used by the Kansas Coordinated Transit District Council (KC-TDC) in evaluating the capital request applications. The applications will be ranked by the KCTDC in January 2016. After the application ranking by the KCTDC, KDOT staff will use the selection criteria in their evaluation of the applications. It should be noted that all items on the application must be completed. Points will be deducted in the ranking process for missing or incomplete information.

All applications must be received to KDOT online by 3 p.m. **Wednesday, December 16, 2015.** Applications received after the deadline will not be accepted.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment proposes revisions to the State of Kansas Plan for Implementation, Maintenance and Enforcement of the 2012 Annual Fine Particulate Matter (PM_{2.5}) National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). This State Implementation Plan (SIP) update, posted for public review on the KDHE website at <http://www.kdheks.gov/bar/planning/pnplanning.html>, is proposed in accordance with the requirements of Section 110 of the Federal Clean Air Act Amendments (CAAA) of 1990. Section 110 of the CAAA requires that each state submit a plan demonstrating the implementation, maintenance and enforcement of the NAAQS to the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit renewal and amendment to previously issued construction permit. Crestwood, Inc. has applied for a Class I operating permit renewal in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-510 et al. The purpose of a Class I permit is to identify the sources and types of regulated air pollutants emitted from the facility; the emission limitations, standards and requirements applicable to each source; and the monitoring, record keeping and

reporting requirements applicable to each source as of the effective date of permit issuance. Notice also is given that certain requirements in the construction permit dated June 1, 2001, are being modified by a modification of permit/approval conditions.

Crestwood, Inc. owns and operates a wood kitchen cabinet and vanity manufacturing facility located at 601 E. Water Well Road, Salina, KS 67401.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation, all information relied upon during the permit application review process and a copy of the modification of approval conditions are available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air, 1000 S.W. A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed documents. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Rasha Allen, KDHE, Bureau of Air, not later than noon November 9, 2015, in order for the secretary of health and environment to consider the request.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the public comment period, within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA's 45-day review period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, December 9, in Room 450, Auditorium A of the Eisenhower State Office Building, 700 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes to existing rules and regulations of the Department of Administration.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Office of the Chief Financial Officer, Attn: Janette Martin, 700 S.W. Harrison, Suite 300, Topeka, 66603, or by email to Janette.Martin@da.ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed changes during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Janette Martin at 785-296-2708 or TTY 800-766-3777. The north entrance to the Eisenhower State Office Building is accessible. Handicapped parking is located across the street from the north entrance to the building.

The state of Kansas proposes to adopt federal subsistence rates effective January 1, 2016. The current methodology establishes rates set by Department of Administration policy based on geographic areas or categories of travel. In addition, the current methodology reimburses travelers based on a meals allowance also set by Department of Administration policy. Federal subsis-

(continued)

tence rates (including meals and lodging) are established based on a standard rate and "non-standard areas." The adoption of these rates will result in subsistence reimbursement which aligns closely with actual travel locations and costs.

With the adoption of federal rates, meal reimbursement will be calculated on a set schedule with a day divided into quarters and the daily meal reimbursement amount divided equally between quarters. This change will utilize delivered SMART functionality, eliminating modifications in place to support current meals allowance policy. The proposed changes will allow the agency head, or the agency head's designee, to approve paying reduced subsistence rates, allowing flexibility to manage travel costs within the approved agency travel budget. Currently, subsistence reductions must be approved by the secretary of administration. The current rate-setting methodology is not mandated in federal law. The changes are not mandated by federal law as a requirement for participating in or implementing a federally subsidized or assisted program.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow:

K.A.R. 1-16-4. Date and hour of departure and return. This regulation addresses the completion of a travel voucher for a period of official state business travel to reflect a leave of absence for proper determination of allowable subsistence expenses. Minor changes are proposed to this regulation to update the wording to current standardized language as well as remove the reference to the DA-121 form and replace it with a broader reference to a subsistence allowance claim. The Department of Administration does not anticipate any economic impact resulting from these changes. These changes will be effective January 1, 2016.

K.A.R. 1-16-8. Use of privately owned or operated conveyance, limitations; reimbursement for transportation and subsistence expenses. This regulation addresses the calculations that agencies use to reimburse state employees who are traveling on state business either in-state or out-of-state. Minor changes are proposed to this regulation to update the wording to current standardized language and grammar usage as well as to incorporate the change in reimbursement methodology from meal allowances to quarter days. The actual economic impact is a function of the frequency and locations traveled by agencies. Under the proposed regulation changes, the agency head has the direct ability to approve reduced subsistence for travel, giving flexibility to manage the approved agency travel budget. These changes will be effective January 1, 2016.

K.A.R. 1-16-15. Reduced allowances. This regulation addresses an agency's ability to reimburse its employees at a rate that is less than the standard rates set by the Department of Administration. Minor changes are proposed to this regulation to update the wording to current standardized language and grammar usage as well as to

incorporate the change in reimbursement methodology from a meals allowance to quarter days. Change is also proposed to allow the agency head, or the agency head's designee, to approve paying reduced subsistence rates, which currently requires approval by the secretary of administration. The actual economic impact is a function of the frequency and locations traveled by agencies. Under the proposed regulation changes, the agency head has the direct ability to approve reduced subsistence for travel, giving flexibility to manage the approved agency travel budget. These changes will be effective January 1, 2016.

K.A.R. 1-16-18. Subsistence allowance. This regulation addresses all subsistence allowances, including meals and lodging, and the limits to those allowances. Minor changes are proposed to this regulation to update the wording to current standardized language and grammar usage as well as to incorporate the change in reimbursement methodology from meal allowances to quarter days. Change is also proposed to delete the use of "out-of-state, designated high cost geographic areas" and "out-of-state, special designated high cost geographic areas" as well as "border city." With the adoption of federal subsistence rates, out-of-state travel will no longer include these designated areas. Additionally, Department of Administration policy will no longer include allowances for border city travel. Another proposed change deletes the exception to allow actual meal expenses for international travel claims. In addition, change is proposed for meal and lodging rates to be issued through, rather than published in, informational circulars. The actual economic impact is a function of the frequency and locations traveled by agencies. Under the proposed regulation changes, the agency head has the direct ability to approve reduced subsistence for travel, giving flexibility to manage the approved agency travel budget. These changes will be effective January 1, 2016.

K.A.R. 1-16-18a. Designated high-cost geographic areas. This regulation defines high-cost geographic areas and addresses how state travelers would be reimbursed if traveling to a high-cost geographic area. Minor changes are proposed to this regulation to update the wording to current standardized language and grammar usage as well as to incorporate the change in reimbursement methodology from a meals allowance to quarter days. Change is proposed to delete the use of "out-of-state, designated high cost geographic areas" and "out-of-state, special designated high cost geographic areas." Current locations with these designations, as well as the option for new locations to be added as designated high cost geographic areas, are deleted as well. With the adoption of federal subsistence rates, which includes meals and lodging, effective with the upgrade to version 9.2 of SMART, out-of-state travel will no longer include these designated areas. In addition, an exception for conference lodging will be added to the K.A.R. title. The actual economic impact is a function of the frequency and locations traveled by agencies. Under the proposed regulation changes, the agency head has the direct ability to approve reduced subsistence for travel, giving flexibility to manage the approved agency travel budget. These changes will be effective January 1, 2016.

Article 3.—PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION OF OIL AND GAS

82-3-304. Tests of gas wells. (a) Initial test.

(1) Each operator shall conduct a multipoint back-pressure test and a one-point stabilized flow test, as specified in K.A.R. 82-3-303, on each gas well producing at least 250 mcf per day. The tests shall be conducted within 30 days of the first gas sales. The test results shall be filed with the commission within 60 days of the first gas sales.

(2) Each operator shall conduct a 24-hour shut-in pressure test on each gas well producing less than 250 mcf per day. Each test shall be conducted within 120 days of the first gas sales. The test results shall be filed with the commission within 150 days of the first gas sales.

(b) Annual test. Before April 1 of each calendar year, each operator shall conduct a one-point stabilized flow test on each gas well producing at least 500 mcf per day. The test results shall be filed with the commission before May 1 of each calendar year.

(c) Test witnessing. Each test shall be conducted under the supervision of the conservation division, which may have an employee witness any test. A test of any individual well may be required by the commission at any time.

(d) Coalbed natural gas exemption.

(1) Any operator of a well producing only coalbed natural gas may seek an exemption from subsection (a) or (b) by filing an application with the conservation division stating that only coalbed natural gas is produced from the well and that testing would be physically impossible or contrary to prudent practices. No well shall be exempt unless the application has been approved by the conservation division.

(2) If the exemption is granted, the exemption shall continue in effect until the well no longer meets the criteria for exemption. The operator shall notify the conservation division immediately if the well begins producing oil or gas other than coalbed natural gas or if the well characteristics change so that testing becomes possible. Executive Order 15-06

Designation of the KANSASWORKS State Board
as the State Workforce Development Board

WHEREAS, The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, 29 U.S.C. Sec. 3101 et. seq., calls for the Governor to establish a State workforce development board, and the Act allows for the designation of any established State entity in existence on December 31, 1997 (including a State council, State workforce development board, or combination of regional boards) as the State workforce investment board, 29 U.S.C. Sec. 3111 (e); and

WHEREAS, The Workforce Network of Kansas Board created through Executive Orders 01-6, 99-6 and 96-3 fulfills the requirements of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, 29 U.S.C. Sec. 3111 et. seq.; and

WHEREAS, The Workforce Network of Kansas Board was established to increase the effectiveness of the training and employment system through combined boards and enhanced cooperation and collaboration among stakeholders at the local and State levels; and

WHEREAS, A multi-partner, multi-component system exists within Kansas comprised of Local Workforce Development boards, Kansas state agencies, one-stop operators, community based organizations and electronic job matching; and

WHEREAS, These individual components have valid and important missions which can be enhanced through continued cooperation and collaboration; and

WHEREAS, Benefits to the several components will be realized through identification as a partner within a system;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby change the name of the Workforce Network of Kansas Board, created through Executive Order 01-6, to the KANSASWORKS State Board and designate the KANSASWORKS State Board (KWSB) as the State workforce development board as set forth in 29 U.S.C. Sec. 3111(a) and (e).

(1) Membership

- (a) Membership of the KWSB State Board shall be by official commission of appointment by the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State.
- (b) The membership shall be composed of such representatives with optimum policy-making authority and demonstrated expertise and experience as may be required by applicable federal or state law. The KWSB shall include the following members:
 - (i) the Governor;
 - (ii) a member of each chamber of the Kansas legislature, which shall be selected by the presiding officer of such chamber;

- (iii) representatives of private businesses (owners, CEOs, or executives), including at least one small businesses, from among those nominated by Kansas business organizations and trade associations, comprising at least 50% membership on the KSWB;
 - (iv) representatives of labor organizations nominated by Kansas labor federations, and a member of a labor organization or training director from a joint labor-management apprenticeship program, comprising at least 20% membership on the KSWB;
 - (v) lead State government officials responsible for core programs, including those administering Wagner-Peyser, Adult Education and Literacy, Vocational Rehabilitation, and Youth, Adult and Dislocated Worker programs; and
 - (vi) chief elected officials representing cities and counties.
- (c) The Governor shall appoint members to the KWSB that represent diverse geographic areas of the State, including urban, rural and suburban areas.
 - (d) All required members shall be voting members of the KWSB.
 - (e) Consistent with federal law, the Governor may appoint ad hoc members to the KWSB that may be designated as voting or non-voting members. Such members may include representatives of community based organizations, one-stop partners, education, veteran affairs, state and local government, tribal organizations, as well as those with expertise handling youth, individuals with barriers to employment, older workers, or economic development.
 - (f) The Chairperson of the KWSB shall be a member representing private sector business and appointed by the Governor by official commission of appointment by the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State. The Chairperson shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. A Vice-Chairperson shall also be appointed by the Governor by official commission of appointment by the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State, and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.
 - (g) The KWSB shall meet upon the call of the Chairperson as necessary to carry out its duties under this Executive Order.

- (2) Compensation. Members of the KWSB shall receive no compensation. To the extent permitted by law, the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, and the School-to-Work and One-Stop Career Center grants, members of the KWSB shall receive subsistence allowances, mileage, and expense reimbursements as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto for travel to and attendance at official meetings of the KWSB. The subsistence allowances, mileage, and expense reimbursements

(continued)

shall be paid from Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act funds appropriated to the Kansas Department of Commerce, except that expenses of other state agency representatives shall be paid by the agencies represented.

(3) Duties. The KWSB shall assist and advise the Governor in:

- (a) developing, implementing, and modifying the State plan;
- (b) reviewing statewide policies, programs, and recommendations on actions that should be taken to align workforce development programs in a manner that supports a comprehensive and streamlined workforce development system in Kansas, including the review and provision of comments on the State plans, if any, for programs and activities of one-stop partners that are not core programs;
- (c) developing and continuously improving the workforce development system in Kansas, including:
 - (i) identifying barriers and means for removing barriers to better coordinate, align and avoid duplication among the programs and activities carried out through the system;
 - (ii) developing strategies to support the use of career pathways for the purpose of providing individuals, including low-skilled adults, youth and individuals with barriers to employment (including individuals with disabilities), with workforce development activities, education and supportive services to enter or retain employment;
 - (iii) developing strategies for providing effective outreach to and improved access for individuals and employers who could benefit from services provided through the workforce development system;
 - (iv) developing and expanding strategies for meeting the needs of employers, workers and jobseekers, particularly through industry or sector partnerships related to in-demand industry sectors and occupations;
 - (v) identifying regions, including planning regions, for the 106(a), and designating local development areas, after consultation with local boards and chief elected officials;
 - (vi) developing and continuously improving the one-stop delivery system in local areas, including providing assistance to local boards, one-stop operators, one-stop partners and providers with planning and delivering services, including training services and supportive services, to support effective delivery of services to workers, jobseekers, and employers; and
 - (vii) developing and updating comprehensive State performance accountability measures, including State adjusted levels of performance, to assess the effectiveness of the core programs in the State;

- (d) developing and updating comprehensive State performance accountability measures, including State adjusted levels of performance, to assess the effectiveness of the core programs in the State;
- (e) identifying and disseminating information on best practices, including:
 - (i) effective operation of one-stop centers, relating to the use of business outreach, partnerships, and service delivery strategies, including strategies for serving individuals with barriers to employment;
 - (ii) development of effective local boards, which may include information on factors that contribute to enabling local boards to exceed negotiated local levels of performance, sustain fiscal integrity, and achieve other measures of effectiveness; and
 - (iii) effective training programs that respond to real-time labor market analysis, that effectively use direct assessment and prior learning assessment to measure an individual's prior knowledge, skills, competencies, and experiences, and that evaluate such skills, and competencies for adaptability, to support efficient placement into employment or career pathways;
- (f) developing and reviewing statewide policies affected the coordinated provision of services through the State's one-stop delivery system, including:
 - (i) objective criteria and procedures for use by local boards in assessing the effectiveness and continuous improvement of one-stop centers;
 - (ii) guidance for the allocation of one-stop center infrastructure funds; and
 - (iii) policies relating to the appropriate roles and contributions of entities carrying out one-stop partner programs within the one-stop delivery system, including approaches to facilitating equitable and efficient cost allocation;
- (g) developing strategies for technological improvement to facilitate access to, and improve the quality of, services and activities provided through the one-stop delivery system, including digital literacy skills, accelerated acquisition of skills and recognized post-secondary credentials by participants, professional development of providers and workforce professionals, and accessible technology for individuals with disabilities and individuals in remote areas;
- (h) developing strategies for aligning technology and data systems across one-stop partner programs to enhance service delivery and improve efficiencies in reporting on performance accountability measures;
- (i) developing allocation formulas for the distribution of funds to local areas for employment and training activities for adults and youth workforce development activities;

- (j) preparing annual reports;
 - (k) developing statewide workforce and labor market information system described in the Wagner-Peyser Act;
 - (l) developing other such policies as may promote statewide objectives for, and enhance the performance of, the workforce development system in Kansas; and
 - (m) performing any additional duties as may be required by current and future applicable employment, training or workforce development federal laws and amendments thereto.
- (4) Bylaws. The KWSB shall establish bylaws to improve operations and ensure the orderly administration and functioning of the KWSB, which shall

include such terms and provisions as required by applicable federal or state law.

Any provision of Executive Order 01-6, Executive Order 99-6 or Executive Order 96-3 inconsistent with the provisions of this Executive Order is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 15-06 and shall become effective immediately.
