Additionally, FHWA has issued a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) for the project. The City of Overland Park, Kansas and the Kansas Turnpike Authority are serving as partners on the study.

The overall environmental study limits begin just south of W. 179th Street and extend to just north of 103rd Street. The overall length is approximately 10 miles. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) announces a public hearing on the 2022 Kansas 303(d) List of Impaired Waters. Section 303(d) of the Clean Water Act requires states to biennially prepare a list of waters failing to meet state water quality standards. Such waters are required to have Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) prepared by the state to restore their water quality. A TMDL is the maximum amount of the impairing pollutant that can enter the water without causing a violation of its water quality standards.

Since 1999, Kansas has developed TMDLs for impaired surface waters in each of the state's 12 river basins. KDHE develops and revises TMDLs for selected impairments identified in the current Section 303(d) list by prioritizing watersheds or waters for restoration and protection. In accordance with the Kansas TMDL development cycle, TMDLs will be developed for total phosphorus during this listing cycle. The draft 2022 Kansas 303(d) List will emphasize nutrient reductions, including an initial designation of TMDLs to be developed over the next two years. The list and its methodology will be made available prior to the hearing at https://www.kdhe.ks.gov/1219/303d-Methodology-List-of-Impaired-Waters.

The public hearing will open with a brief summary of the list and its methodology as it pertains to the waters of the state. Public testimony will then be taken after the presentation. Please provide a written copy of any testimony at the hearing. Written testimony will be accepted by KDHE any time prior to the close of business on March 26, 2022. KDHE will prepare a response to all public comments and revise the draft list as necessary. KDHE will submit the list, the methodology, and any public comments with KDHE's response to Region 7 of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on March 30, 2022.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has prepared a draft combined Kansas/NPDES Water Pollution Control general permit for the discharge of hydrostatic test water from new pipelines and storage tanks, and/or existing pipelines and storage tanks exposed to crude oil and refined petroleum products or natural/liquified petroleum gases or other chemicals.

A general wastewater permit is provided for those entities engaged in similar activities and discharging the same types of wastewater. The wastewater from these types of activities has a low public health and environmental risk. A general permit is placed on public notice once during the life of the permit and then is made available, without further public notice, to entities for activities which meet the requirements of the permit. The permittees are also required to meet all other federal, state, and local requirements. To be covered under the draft permit, the permittee is required to submit the notice of intent and receive a signed and dated permit from KDHE.

The draft permit contains limits for oil and grease, pH and total suspended solids and monitoring for flow and total residual chlorine (if present in the source water) for all discharges plus chemical oxygen demand, naphthalene, and benzene limits for pipelines and storage vessels exposed to petroleum products. In addition, this permit covers hydrotest of pipes/tanks used to transport/store other chemicals. Parameter limits for these other chemicals are based on the Kansas Water Quality Criteria and Federal Regulations.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has received a permit modification request to expand the disposal area at the Deffenbaugh Industries Johnson County, Kansas landfill operating under KDHE Permit 263. The Johnson County, Kansas landfill is located at 17955 Holliday Dr., Shawnee, Kansas, in parts of Section 1 and the North ½ of Section 12, Township 12 South, Range 23 East plus parts of the West ½ of Section 6 and the Northwest ¼ of Section 7, Township12 South, Range 24 East. The application presents that Deffenbaugh Industries proposes to add 28.2 acres of disposal area to the Phase 6 disposal area permitted in 2007. This additional area is within the site's Barker Road berm adjacent to Phase 6, west and north of the Phase 6 currently permitted disposal area limits. This will result in the approximately 850-acre landfill site containing approximately 478 acres permitted for solid waste disposal. The proposed Phase 6 expansion will provide approximately 5.65 million additional cubic yards, a 6.7 percent disposal capacity increase, extending the site's life by about 3.2 years, which with currently permitted disposal areas will provide Johnson County, Kansas with a municipal solid waste disposal facility for about 19 years.

The expanded Phase 6 disposal area will be built to the Subtitle D standards used for new municipal solid waste disposal areas at the Johnson County, Kansas landfill since the standards' adoption by KDHE in 1994. These standards require disposal areas be constructed with a bottom liner consisting of an impervious geomembrane liner atop a two-foot-thick layer of compacted clay. The liner is sloped with a drainage layer atop it so that liquids that may percolate through the waste drain to a sump and are removed from the landfill for treatment or disposal.

The Johnson County Commission has certified that the expansion is consistent with the county's solid waste management plan and the City of Shawnee, Kansas has certified that the expansion is consistent with local zoning requirements. KDHE has reviewed the application and found it to be in conformance with the state solid waste statutes and regulations.

KDHE is today providing public notice of their intent to approve the proposed Johnson County, Kansas land-fill expansion. However, a final decision to approve the expansion has not been made, and KDHE will consider information gathered during a public comment period before making a final decision. **WHEREAS**, ensuring the effective delivery of public human services is a necessary component of healthy communities;

WHEREAS, certain Kansas state health facilities are certified and receive funding through federal Medicare and Medicaid programs;

WHEREAS, the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has published an interim final rule establishing requirements regarding COVID-19 vaccine immunization of staff among Medicare- and Medicaid-certified providers and suppliers;

WHEREAS, attempts to prevent enforcement of the CMS rule failed to receive temporary relief from the United States Supreme Court, creating an active requirement to comply in order to receive needed funds for medical care; and

WHEREAS, the loss of CMS funding would result in the loss of services for Kansas veterans, elderly, and disabled;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas as head of the Executive Branch, I hereby direct the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services, the Kansas Commission on Veterans Affairs Office, and any other state agency impacted by the CMS Interim Final Rule to comply with all provisions of state law related to COVID-19 vaccine immunization when developing policies in accordance with federal guidelines issued under QSO-22-09-ALL.

Policies must include clear and specific reference to provisions of 2021 Special Session House Bill 2001, including but not limited to:

- Medical exemptions. Facilities shall grant an exemption to the federal COVID-19 vaccine requirement if the employee submits a written waiver request stating that complying with the requirement would endanger the life or health of the employee or an individual who resides with the employee, as evidenced by an accompanying written statement signed by a physician or another person who performs acts pursuant to practice agreements, protocols or at the order, direction or delegation of a physician.
- Religious exemptions. Facilities shall grant an exemption to the federal COVID-19 vaccine requirement if the employee submits a written waiver request stating that complying with the requirement would violate sincerely held religious beliefs of the employee. Religious beliefs include, but is not limited to, theistic and non-theistic moral and ethical beliefs as to what is right and wrong that are sincerely held with the strength of traditional religious views. Facilities shall not inquire into the sincerity of the request.

Policies must also comply with the "COVID-19 vaccination passport" proviso in 2021 Senate Bill 159, which prevents state agencies from issuing to any individual without consent or requiring an individual to use for any purpose a "COVID-19 vaccination passport," defined as any written or electronic documentation of an individual's COVID-19 vaccination status.

- Documentation. Facilities shall not require an individual to provide documentation of their COVID-19 vaccination status. Facilities may request such documentation, but must make it clear that providing documentation is not a condition of employment and that no adverse action will be taken if the employee does not provide it.
- **Self-Attestation.** Facilities may require and record a verbal self-attestation of COVID-19 vaccination status from any individual who does not provide documentation **and** does not request an exemption from the vaccination requirement as allowed by

2021 Special Session House Bill 2001 and the facility policy as previously directed. The facility, not the individual, will be responsible for documenting the individual's self-attested vaccination status.

This directive shall apply to all facilities under the direction of the Executive Branch of the State of Kansas, including but not limited to:

- Kansas Veterans Home
- Kansas Soldiers Home
- Kansas Neurological Institute
- Parsons State Hospital
- Larned State Hospital (CMS-funded portions)
- Osawatomie State Hospital (CMS-funded portions)
