The State of Kansas will submit a five-year Medicaid 1115 demonstration waiver renewal application to the (continued)

Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in December 2022 for an anticipated effective date of January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2028, seeking federal approval to renew select initiatives of the KanCare program (Project Number 11-W-00283/7). No impacts to eligibility, services, or benefits are anticipated because of this renewal.

This abbreviated public notice provides information regarding the proposed renewal request to CMS.

The renewal seeks to continue the authorization of the State of Kansas to provide critical elements of the KanCare 2.0 demonstration waiver that cannot be transitioned to more permanent Medicaid authorities. The elements that would continue under the KanCare 1115 demonstration waiver renewal include:

Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Coverage

Maintains access to specific SUD services and the SUD institutions for mental disease (IMD) exclusion to continue the success of enhanced access to care for members with a SUD.

12-month Continuous Eligibility Coverage

Renews the 12-month continuous eligibility coverage for parents and other caretaker relatives using Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI). This renewal will support continued access to Medicaid services and reduce churn in the Medicaid program, providing better opportunities to access care.

Public Health Emergency (PHE) Coverage

Maintains continuous eligibility for individuals enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) who turn 19 during the PHE in order to reduce gaps in coverage immediately after the PHE. It also maintains access to federal financial participation (i.e., federal share of funding) for this continuous eligibility coverage.

The draft KanCare 1115 demonstration waiver renewal, the full public notice, and Tribal notification have been posted on the KanCare website at https://www.kancare.ks.gov.

About the Renewal

Given the success and stability of the current KanCare program, Kansas proposes to transition features of the Section 1115 demonstration that do not require 1115 demonstration waiver expenditure authority to more permanent federal authorities. While this transition will impact the way the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) and the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) interact with CMS, the intent of this renewal is to ensure people still have access to the care and services they have come to expect through the demonstration. This approach also seeks to preserve needed flexibilities for the KanCare program, while providing certainty to KanCare members that the program will continue for years to come.

Kansas's vision for the 1115 demonstration waiver renewal is to embed successful waiver programs within more permanent Medicaid authorities, thus creating a stable and supportive safety net for KanCare beneficiaries. The 1115 demonstration waiver renewal will maintain stability for continuous eligibility and SUD services that cannot be authorized elsewhere and therefore has a

goal of providing enhanced access to services for Kansas Medicaid beneficiaries.

Opportunities to Provide Input

The draft KanCare Medicaid 1115 demonstration waiver renewal is open for public comment from November 17, 2022 to December 17, 2022. The State of Kansas encourages all interested parties — members, families, caregivers, providers, tribal partners, managed care organizations — to provide input through the process described below.

A public hearing will be conducted at 2:00 p.m. Thursday, January 19, 2023, in the Bank Commissioner's Conference Room A, Jayhawk Tower Building, Fourth Floor, 700 SW Jackson, Topeka, KS 66603, to consider proposed Kansas Administrative Regulation 17-11-24, an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner regarding sales of tangible personal property to executive officers, employees, directors, and related interests.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing by mailing them to the Office of the State Bank Commissioner, 700 SW Jackson, Suite 300, Topeka, KS 66603-3796 or by email to Brock.Roehler@osbckansas.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally or in writing regarding the new K.A.R. 17-11-24 during the public hearing. In or-

A summary of the proposed regulation and economic impact follows.

Summary: K.A.R. 17-11-24 is a new regulation that creates rules where a bank or trust company may sell tangible personal property to bank executive officers, employees, directors, and related interests without receiving the Bank Commissioner's preapproval under K.S.A 9-1112.

Economic Impact: This regulation removes a bureaucratic burden on state banks and trust companies to quickly offload other assets and fixed assets on their books. The Banking Code does not require a bank or trust company to receive the Commissioner's preapproval to sell tangible personal property to a person with no business ties with the bank or trust company. However, a bank or trust company needs the commissioner's approval if the sale is to an executive officer, employee, director, or related interest. All other sales to an executive officer, employee, director, or related interest would need commissioner approval under K.S.A. 9-1112, including real estate. It is also important to note that if the sale of personal property is financed by the bank, federal law requires any loan to an executive officer or director or a related interest of each to be at no more favorable terms than what a similar bank consumer could receive.

The Office of the State Bank Commissioner's office expects a very marginal record retention expense due to a bank or trust company keeping a record of the sale for review at the next examination.

7. The hearing will be held at 10:00 a.m. January 17, 2023, in the Kansas Board of Regents Board Room, 1000 SW Jackson St., Suite 520, Topeka, KS 66612.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for receiving written public comments on the proposed new regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulations during the hearing. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact statement of the regulations follows:

The 2021 Legislature established a new service scholarship program for students enrolled in eligible programs at any Kansas community college, technical college, the Washburn Institute of Technology, or certain private postsecondary institutions, 35 institutions in all. The legislation requires, with certain exceptions, that each student receiving these scholarship dollars agree to reside and work in Kansas for two years following completion of their Promise Act eligible program. \$10,000,000 was appropriated to the Board to fund this scholarship in each of Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023. The legislation anticipates another \$10,000,000 to fund future Fiscal Years of the scholarship at that \$10,000,000 amount.

These regulations: 1) provide definitions of key terms

not defined by the statute; 2) set forth the process to apply for a Promise scholarship and appeal a denial or revocation of a Promise scholarship; 3) set forth the terms to be included in a Promise scholarship agreement and the requirements for successful completion of, postponement of, or release from the service obligation; and 4) establish the process for repayment of any Promise scholarship when the service or other requirements are not met or forgiven.

There is no anticipated economic impact on specific businesses, sectors, public utility ratepayers, or local governments as this Act/regulations do not affect those entities directly. The students who qualify for a scholarship under this program and who successfully complete an eligible educational program and their two-year service requirement will greatly benefit from it financially as it will pay for tuition, required fees, books, and required materials for the Promise eligible program selected by the student. Students who are unable to meet or be excused from the service obligation attached to the scholarship will be responsible for repayment of the scholarship plus interest at the federal PLUS program rate (currently 7.54%). The qualified public higher education institutions at which these individuals choose to enroll will award the scholarships and be reimbursed by funds appropriated by the Legislature for this purpose. Individuals affected by the regulations will benefit financially from receiving a scholarship, the value of which will vary according to the student's individual calculated financial need and cost of the program. Kansas businesses will benefit to the extent additional trained individuals remain in Kansas communities to work after completion of their programs. The regulations, in and of themselves, will have no direct effect, as the regulations simply stipulate how the Board of Regents and the participating institutions shall implement the Kansas Promise Scholarship Act.

There will be no direct economic impact on other public agencies or private businesses as a result of these regulations. The regulations will neither enhance nor restrict business activities and growth other than as discussed previously in this section.
