Notice of Available Grant Funding

Grant funds are available from the Federal John R. Justice Student Loan Repayment Program for calendar year 2024. The purpose of this grant program is to provide student loan repayment assistance for full-time local, state, and federal government public defenders and full-time local and state government prosecutors who commit to serving as public defenders and prosecutors for at least three years. Kansas has \$86,028 available for awards and will be available to prosecutors (maximum of \$43,014) and public defenders (maximum of \$43,014). Federal John R. Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) will conduct a public hearing at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, March 28, 2024, in the Basement Conference Room, New England Building, 503 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, KS 66603, to consider the adoption of proposed regulation set K.A.R. 26-52-1 to 26-52-32 concerning licensure and survey requirements for crisis intervention centers.

The proposed regulation set is authorized by and implements K.S.A. 39-2001 *et seq.*, specifically K.S.A. 39-2004. The Crisis Intervention Act, K.S.A. 59-29c01, *et seq.*, provides for voluntary and involuntary admissions of adults with mental illness, substance abuse, or co-occurring conditions for emergency evaluation and treatment up to 72 hours. The Crisis Intervention Act imposes requirements for evaluations at specified intervals to determine if the patient continues to meet criteria for admission to a crisis intervention center. Within 48 hours after admission, the head of the crisis intervention center must file an affidavit with the district court where the center is located requesting an extension of time and supporting documentation to continue detaining and providing treatment to an involuntary patient for the period exceeding 48 hours up to 72 hours after admission. The head of the treatment facility must discharge the patient at any time the patient is determined to no longer meet admission criteria. If the patient continues to meet admission criteria 72 hours after admission, the head of the treatment facility must file a petition under the appropriate care and treatment act and find placement for the patient.

KDADS conducted a public hearing regarding the costs of compliance and consulted with Wyandotte and Douglas County community mental health facilities to discuss the economic impact. The agency estimates that there will likely be only three applicants in the first two years, with a patient size to vary in those facilities anywhere from 4 to 32 beds, with an average of 16 beds per facility. KDADS estimates that the \$1.6 million estimated cost will be for staffing and services to those served in mental health facilities. KDADS understands the costs will be high for compliance with the regulations, however the benefits to the community with a Crisis Intervention Center will support the overall health infrastructure of communities statewide. KDADS views sizeable benefits for the use of these facilities and referral to community services at a lower cost than long term institutionalization of individuals.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day of the hearing to Stephanie Volle, Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services, 503 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, KS 66603 or by email to stephanie.volle1@ks.gov. During the hearing, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulations as well as an opportunity to submit their written comments. It is requested that each individual giving oral comments also provide a written copy for the record. In order to give each individual an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary for the hearing officer to request that each presenter limit an oral presentation to an appropriate time frame.

A public hearing will be conducted by the staff of the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board (BSRB) from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 26, 2024, in the BSRB conference room, 700 SW Harrison St., Suite 420, Topeka, Kansas, to consider proposed changes to administrative regulations for several professions regulated by the BSRB. There is metered parking all around the Eisenhower State Office Building. The public entrance is on the north side of the building. To ensure that there is adequate space for public attendees, all individuals wishing to attend the hearing must notify David Fye, Executive Director for the BSRB, no later than two business days prior to the hearing by sending an email to david.fye@ks.gov. At the hearing all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally. To give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes or less, depending on the number of attendees that wish to speak. Oral comments will be recorded by staff members of the BSRB and summarized for the Board at the next full Board meeting when changes or adoption of the regulations are considered by the Board.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation to participate in the hearing should be made at least five business days in advance of the hearing by contacting Leslie Allen, Assistant Director, at 785-296-3240 or leslie.allen@ks.gov.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for purposes of receiving written public comments on the proposed amendments. Email comments may be directed to david.fye@ks.gov.

The board does not have a less costly or less intrusive method for achieving the stated purpose of these regulations. The regulations that will be considered during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

Summary

K.A.R. 102-2-6; K.A.R. 102-3-3a; K.A.R. 102-4-3a; K.A.R. 102-5-3; K.A.R. 102-5-7b; K.A.R. 102-5-10; K.A.R. 102-7-3; K.A.R. 102-7-4; K.A.R. 102-7-5; K.A.R. 102-7-7; K.A.R. 102-7-8

These proposed changes to regulations primarily involve updating and modernizing alternate educational requirements for licensure for license applicants who attended non-accredited schools, including allowing an “in-residence” requirement to be met either in person or by synchronous video conferencing for the social work, professional counseling, marriage and family therapy, and addiction counseling professions; expanding the list

of qualifying degrees needed to be held by the person chairing or directing a professional counseling program; recognizing a national accrediting body for the addiction counseling profession to satisfy educational requirements for licensure; and eliminating a distinction between “core faculty” and other faculty for the master’s level psychology profession. Several other changes include synching regulations with language in recently passed legislation and adding clarifying language for master’s level addiction counselors.

Economic Impact

It is estimated that these changes will increase overall revenue by \$1,600 in FY 2025 and each year beyond, through additional individuals meeting the requirements for licensure. Of this amount, \$1,440 would be revenue for the BSRB Fee Fund and \$160 be revenue for the State General Fund.
