Opinion No. 2014-01

Written March 19, 2014, to Kimberly Steves, Supervisor, Environmental Radiation, Emergency Preparedness, Bureau of Environmental Health, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Topeka.

Synopsis: Under the facts presented, utilization of state employees' house for radon remediation training of state certified radon mitigation technicians that involves installation of a radon remediation system is an economic opportunity that may not be accepted by a state employee unless a statutory exception is met or is part of an employee's total compensation.

Cited herein: K.S.A. 46-216, 46-217, 2013 Supp. 46-237a, and K.A.R. 19-40-3a(b).

Dear Ms. Steves:

We understand that you have requested this opinion in your capacity as supervisor of Environmental Radiation, Emergency Preparedness for Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). This opinion is in response to your request to the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission (Commission), concerning application of the state governmental ethics law, K.S.A. 46-215 et seq. We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction is limited to the applicability of K.S.A. 46-215 et seq., and the Commission's opinion does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

Factual Statement

An agency sponsored Radon mitigation training for agency staff and radon remediation technicians certified by KDHE will utilize a house that is owned by state employees, one of which is a KDHE employee. This house came to the attention of agency staff through one of the owners who is employed with the agency. The selection of the home is due to the specific characteristics requiring multiple techniques for mitigation. These varied mitiga-

tion approaches, coupled with the owners' grant of unfettered access for remediation purposes, present a rare opportunity for training. The training will be video-taped for use in developing a computer based training program in diagnostic and mitigation techniques. The program will be available to all Kansas certified technicians for continuing education credit. The mitigation training will result in the installation of a Radon mitigation system in the state employees' house. The system consists of a fan unit, PVC pipe and brackets for mounting. Agency staff consider the opportunity that the state employees' house presents for the training is of equal or greater value to the agency than the value of the mitigation system and its installation in the state employees' house.

Question

Does installation of a radon mitigation system in a house owned by state employees at no cost constitute a gift or economic opportunity to the state employees in violation of K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 46-237a?

Analysis and Opinion

A gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service received by state employees is not prohibited by the state governmental ethics law unless it is provided because of the official position of a state employee. K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 46-237a(b). "'Gift' means the transfer of money or anything of value unless legal consideration of a reasonably equal or greater value is received in return." K.A.R. 19-40-3a(b). "The value of a gift shall be the fair market value or a reasonable estimate thereof. Where a transfer is made for less than reasonable consideration, the amount by which the value of the transfer exceeds the value of the consideration shall be deemed a gift." K.A.R. 19-40-3a(b)(1).

The KDHE staff have concluded the rare opportunity to utilize the employees' house, unfettered for purposes of conducting and video recording a mitigation training, outweighs the value an installed mitigation system to the employees. This opportunity is lawful consideration for an installed mitigation system. Consequently, the installed mitigation system is not prohibited by K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 46-237a insofar as the system is not a gift.

Since the installed mitigation system is not a gift, is it an economic opportunity? "'Economic opportunity' means any purchase, sale, lease, contract, option, or other transaction or arrangement involving property or services wherein a state [...] employee [...] may gain a personal economic benefit, but not including any gift." K.S.A. 46-217. Installation of a mitigation system in a house is an economic benefit when done at no cost to the owner who would otherwise have to pay. Under the present facts, this economic opportunity is a result of a "transaction or arrangement involving property or services." Therefore the mitigation system is an "economic opportunity," the receipt of which by a state employee due to their official position is prohibited.

In Governmental Ethics Opinion 1999-50, the Commission determined that:

the term "official position" refers to an individual's particular position with the [s]tate and does not apply generally to a person because they are a [s]tate employee. For guidance, the Commission notes that a gift or discount

which is provided to all [s]tate employees is not being provided to a person because of his or her "official position." On the other hand, a gift or discount which is provided to all purchasing agents, for example, or all employees of a particular agency, will be deemed to be provided because of such persons' "official position."

Applying this meaning of "official position," to the present facts, the selection of the KDHE employee's house was because of that employee's official position. Even so, subparagraphs (1)-(4) of K.S.A. 46-237a(b) provide exceptions that allow a state employee to accept such benefits even if received because of their official position:

- (1) A gift having an aggregate value of less than \$40 given at a ceremony or public function where the person is accepting the gift in such person's official capacity; or
- (2) gifts from relatives or gifts from personal friends when it is obvious to the person that the gift is not being given because of the person's official position; or
- (3) anything of value received by the person on behalf of the state that inures to the benefit of the state or that becomes the property of the state; or
- (4) contributions solicited on behalf of a nonprofit organization which is exempt from taxation under paragraph (3) of subsection (c) of section 501 of the internal revenue code of 1986, as amended.

Among these exceptions only one provided under subparagraph (3) is arguably applicable. As noted previously, the opportunity to provide mediation training is a benefit that inures to the state as a result of this transaction between KDHE and the state employee. However, the economic benefit received through the transaction by the state employee is the mitigation system. The system benefits the state employees and no benefit from the mitigation system itself inures to the state. Hence, the subparagraph (3) exception does not apply. Without an applicable exception, acceptance of an installed radon mitigation system in their house, an economic benefit because of one owner's official position, violates K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 46-237a(b).

In Opinion No. 2002-08 the Commission determined that state employees subject to K.S.A. 46-237a could not accept gifts, discounts, or access to entertainment and sporting events from anyone, including state agencies, unless one of the enumerated exceptions applied. The Commission also noted in the same opinion that state employees may accept such items as part of their compensation. Compensation is defined by K.S.A. 46-216 as "any money, thing of value, or economic benefit conferred on, or received by, any person in return for services rendered, or to be rendered, by such person or another." Accordingly, if something of value other than salary is given to an employee by the agency, it must be considered part of his or her total compensation package to not violate K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 46-237a(b).

Subject to the terms and requirements of the Official Notice of Bond Sale dated March 18, 2014, of the city of Garden City, Kansas, bids to purchase the city's General Obligation Tax Increment Bonds, Series A, 2014, will be received at the office of the city clerk at the City Administrative Center, 301 N. 8th, Garden City, KS 67846, or by telefacsimile at 620-276-1169, until 11 a.m. (CDT) Tuesday, April 15, 2014. Bids received will be considered by the governing body at its meeting at 1 p.m. on the sale date.

No oral or auction bids for the bonds shall be considered, and no bid for less than 100 percent of the total principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest to the date of delivery shall be considered.

Good Faith Deposit

Each bidder must submit a good faith deposit in the form of cash deposited in the city's account by electronic transfer, a certified or cashier's check made payable to the order of the city, or a financial surety bond (all as further described in the Official Notice of Bond Sale), in an amount equal to 2 percent of the principal amount of the bonds.

Details of the Bonds

The bonds are dated May 1, 2014, and will be issued as registered bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. Interest on the bonds is payable semiannually on May 1 and November 1 of each year, beginning May 1, 2015. Principal of the bonds becomes due on November 1 in the years and amounts as shown below:

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 1.—DISEASES

28-1-23. Management of occupational exposures.

(a) For the purpose of this regulation, each of the following terms shall have the meaning specified in this subsection:

(1) "Occupational exposure" means any occupational exposure, as defined in K.S.A. 65-116a and amendments thereto, that occurs to any of the following under the conditions specified:

(A) Any individual providing medical or nursing services, clinical or forensic laboratory services, emergency medical services, or firefighting, law enforcement, or correctional services, whether for compensation or as a volunteer;

(B) any individual in training for certification, licensure, a position, or a job providing any services listed in paragraph (a)(1)(A); or

(C) any individual receiving services from an individual specified in paragraph (a)(1)(A) or (B).

(2) "Exposed person" means any individual who had an occupational exposure.

(3) "Source person" means any individual from whom an occupational exposure originated.

(4) "Infection control officer" means the individual on duty and designated to monitor and respond to occupational exposures by an entity providing medical or nursing services, clinical or forensic laboratory services, emergency medical services, or firefighting, law enforcement, or correctional services.

(b) Each exposed person specified in paragraph (a)(1)(A) or (B) shall inform the entity's infection control officer about the occupational exposure as soon as possible, but within four hours of the occupational exposure.

(c) The infection control officer shall determine whether the occupational exposure was sufficient to potentially transmit a pathogen or an infectious and contagious disease, considering current guidelines from the Kansas department of health and environment, the centers for disease control and prevention, and the United States public health service.

(d) If the infection control officer determines that the occupational exposure was sufficient to potentially transmit a pathogen or an infectious and contagious disease, the infection control officer shall direct that an appropriate specimen be obtained from the source person for testing.

(1) If the source person refuses to provide a specimen for testing, the infection control officer may submit an application to a court of competent jurisdiction for an order requiring the source person to submit an appropriate specimen for testing. The application shall include the following:

(A) An allegation that the source person has refused to provide an appropriate specimen for testing following an occupational exposure;

(B) the specific test or tests needed to be performed; and

(C) specification of whether and how frequently any additional tests may be required.

(2) If the source person has died and the infection control officer requests a specimen, the custodian of the source person's remains shall obtain and preserve an appropriate specimen from the source person for testing.

(e) If a person who has been transported to a health care facility is subsequently determined to be a source person of a pathogen or an infectious and contagious disease that can be transmitted from person to person through the air or by exposure to respiratory droplets, the following notifications shall be required:

(1) Within four hours of the diagnosis, the treating health care provider shall notify the infection control officer of the health care facility of the presence of a source person.

(2) Within four hours of receiving notification from the treating health care provider, the infection control officer of the health care facility shall provide to the entity that transported the source person at least the following information:

(A) The name of the source person;

(B) the diagnosis; and

(C) the date and time the source person was transported to the health care facility.

(3) Within four hours of receiving notification from the health care facility, the infection control officer of the entity that transported the source person shall notify all other entities whose personnel could have cared for or interacted with the source person in a manner that could transmit the pathogen or the infectious and contagious disease and shall provide at least the following information:

(A) The name of the source person;

(B) the diagnosis; and

(C) the date and time the source person was transported to the health care facility.

(f) The results of the infectious and contagious disease test or tests shall be disclosed to the exposed person, the infection control officer responsible for the exposed person, and the source person as soon as possible. To the extent feasible, the disclosure to the exposed person shall not include the name or identity of the source person.

(g) If an infection control officer has determined that a person who is or has been in the care or custody of an individual providing medical or nursing services, emergency medical services, or firefighting, law enforcement, or correctional services has been exposed to an infectious and contagious disease, blood, or other potentially infectious materials by the individual providing those services, the infection control officer shall advise the exposed person and recommend appropriate testing as soon as feasible. HOUSE BILL No. 2599

AN ACT authorizing the secretary of state to grant an easement to the unified government of Wyandotte county, Kansas.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) The secretary of state is hereby authorized and directed to grant an easement on land owned by the state of Kansas along the north bank of the Kansas river in Wyandotte county and within and without the city of Kansas City, Kansas, to the unified government of Wyandotte county/Kansas City for use as a boat ramp. Such easement shall be 80 feet in width and shall be 40 feet on each side of the following

described line: Commencing at the northwest corner of southwest quarter of section 22-T11S, R25E; Thence north 86 degrees 14 minutes 35 seconds east, along the north line of said southwest quarter, 1363.51 feet, to a point on the centerline of 7th street (US 169 highway); Thence south 03 degrees 39 minutes 31 seconds east, along said centerline of 7th Street, 1140.53 feet, to a point on the north line of the kaw valley drainage district permanent easement; Thence south 47 degrees 23 minutes 54 seconds east, 310.05 feet, to a point at the northerly end center point of a 20.00 foot wide boat ramp; Thence south 63 degrees 26 minutes 06 seconds east, 150.00 feet, along the centerline of said boat ramp to the approximate water line of the Kaw river; Thence continuing south 63 degrees 23 minutes 06 seconds east, 36.00 feet, along the centerline of said boat ramp to the southerly end of said boat ramp; subject to survey and any easement and restrictions of record.

(b) The unified government of Wyandotte county/Kansas City is hereby authorized to acquire the easement described in subsection (a) for use as an emergency management boat ramp for the Kansas City, Kansas fire department. Such easement shall be conditioned on the uni-

fied government of Wyandotte county/Kansas City prohibiting public access to such easement and assuming full responsibility for such use and holding the state of Kansas harmless therefor.

(c) The legal document granting the easement described under subsection (a) shall be approved by the attorney general and shall be executed by the secretary of state. The conveyance may be in such form as determined to be in the best interest of the state by the attorney general in consultation with the secretary of state.

(d) In the event the secretary of state determines that the legal description of the parcel described by this section is incorrect, the secretary of state may grant the easement utilizing the correct legal description but the legal document granting the easement shall be subject to approval by the attorney general.

(e) The conveyance of the easement authorized by this section shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3043a or K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 75-6609, and amendments thereto.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
