




Current design

One form of photo identification permitted by the SAFE Act is "a student identification card issued by an accredited postsecondary institution of education in the state of Kansas." Postsecondary institutions are accredited by nongovernmental accrediting agencies. Accrediting agencies are private educational associations of regional or national scope that develop criteria and conduct evaluations to determine whether the criteria are met. Institutions requesting an agency's evaluation and then complying with the agency's criteria become "accredited" by the accrediting agency.

Although the government does not accredit postsecondary institutions, the U.S. Secretary of Education is required by law to publish a list of nationally recognized accrediting agencies. The U.S. Department of Education website contains a spreadsheet listing all postsecondary institutions in the United States that are accredited by what the Secretary of Education deems to be reliable authorities. The information is updated periodically throughout each year.

When viewing the list on the website it is important to note that each institution can be accredited by multiple accrediting agencies. In those cases the institution will be listed multiple times on the Department of Education list. The attached list was posted to the Department of Education website in August 2011. 

# Employee badges or identification documents issued by a municipal, county, state or federal government office or agency

KSA 25-2908(h)(1)(E)



There is no uniform badge for municipal, county, state, or federal government employees. Typically each agency issues its own unique badge. Some agencies have multiple types of badges in order to distinguish the area in which the employee works. These badges can be either vertical or horizontal. Government employee badges typically contain a seal of either the agency or the Government body issuing the badge. Below are samples of government issued badges. Most Government issued badges will bear at least some resemblance to one of the attached samples.
