through September 24, 2022. After reviewing the testimony and public comments, KDHE will make appropriate revisions to the TMDLs and submit them to Region 7 of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), Division of Environment, Bureau of Air, will conduct a public hearing at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, November 3, 2022, in Room 530, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 SW Jackson, Topeka, Kansas, to consider the adoption of proposed amended air quality regulation K.A.R. 28-19-517 regarding Class I operating permits, annual emissions inventory, and fees; the adoption of amended air quality regulation K.A.R. 28-19-546 regarding Class II operating permits, annual emission inventory, and fees; and the adoption of amended air quality regulation K.A.R. 28-19-564 regarding Class II operating permits, permits-by-rule, and sources with actual emissions less than 50 percent of major source thresholds. Upon adop-

tion of these regulations, KDHE will submit the Class II operating permit regulations to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) for approval into the State Implementation Plan (SIP) and the Class I operating permit regulation as a revision to the approved State of Kansas Part 70 Operating Permit Program.

A summary of the proposed regulations and estimated economic impact follows:

Summary of Regulations:

K.A.R. 28-19-517. Class I operating permits; annual emissions inventory and fees.

KDHE is proposing revisions to K.A.R. 28-19-517 Class I source annual emissions inventory and fee requirements. The proposed amendments will require all Class I sources to utilize the KDHE electronic emissions inventory submission system. Effective upon promulgation of these amendments, KDHE will no longer accept paper submissions for annual inventory and the associated paper submittal fees will be eliminated.

KDHE is proposing to increase the emissions fee schedule from the existing \$1,000 base fee or \$53.00 per ton of emissions to the sum of an annual facility fee of \$1,000 for all sources, \$56.00 per ton of criteria emissions fee, and \$80.00 per ton of hazardous air pollutant (HAP) fee. The proposed fee changes will become effective January 1, 2025.

K.A.R. 28-19-546. Class II operating permits; annual emission inventory and fees.

KDHE is proposing to amend K.A.R. 28-19-546 to establish a Class II fee schedule and clarify inventory submission requirements on which the fees are based. Proposed amendments include language outlining procedures for submitting annual emissions inventory electronically, currently implemented using the KDHE electronic emissions inventory submission system, and annual emission fees beginning in calendar year 2025 of \$56.00 per ton of criteria emissions and \$80.00 per ton of hazardous air pollutant emissions. Additional provisions are being proposed to establish late fee and refund requirements for both inventory and fees.

K.A.R. 28-19-564. Class II operating permits; permits-by-rule; sources with actual emissions less than 50 percent of major source thresholds.

KDHE is proposing to amend K.A.R. 28-19-564 paragraph (e) to require all permits-by-rule Class II sources and those with actual emissions less than 50 percent of major source thresholds to submit annual emissions inventory and fees by April 1 of each year (currently February 15) as required by the proposed K.A.R. 28-19-546.

Economic Impact:

The proposed amendments impose no additional costs to the implementing agency, other governmental agencies, units, or the general public.

Cost to the regulated community: Class I sources required to submit an annual emissions inventory pursuant to K.A.R. 28-19-517 will incur a cost in emission fees ranging from \$1,000 to \$56–\$80 per ton of emissions beginning in calendar year 2025. KDHE projects an increase in annual cost to the regulated community from the proposed fees beginning in 2025 compared to 2021

to be approximately \$171,000 for the facility fee, \$117,564 for criteria emissions fee and \$222,013 for HAP emissions fee. KDHE estimates the total costs that are reasonably expected to be incurred by the regulated community to be approximately \$510,577 in 2025.

Class II sources required to submit an annual emissions inventory pursuant to K.A.R. 28-19-546 and 28-19-564 will incur a cost in emission fees ranging from \$1,000 to \$56-\$80 per ton of emissions beginning in calendar year 2025. KDHE projects an increase in annual cost to the regulated community from the proposed fees beginning in 2025 to be approximately \$572,497 for criteria emissions fee and \$43,730 for HAP emissions fee. KDHE estimates the total costs that are reasonably expected to be incurred by the regulated community to be approximately \$616,227 in 2025.

A detailed economic impact is provided in the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 28-19-517 and in the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 28-19-546 and 28-19-564 that are available from the designated KDHE contact staff person or at the KDHE Bureau of Air public notice website, as listed below.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. K.A.R. 100-69-10. License renewal; continuing education.

The purpose of this proposed regulation amendment is to eliminate the requirement that athletic trainer licensees

(continued)

participate in at least two categories of annual continuing education listed in this regulation. Beginning in 2022, the national athletic training certification process has eliminated the requirement to complete “evidence-based practice” (“EBP”) continuing education courses. This has resulted in an ever-shrinking market of EBP courses available to Kansas athletic trainer licensees. Eliminating the requirement of two categories of continuing education courses does not change the total hours of continuing education required for license renewal (20 hours each year) or remove credit for EBP courses. This proposed regulation amendment eliminates only the requirement that continuing education courses must be completed in at least two categories, which in the past has generally included completing at least one course in the EBP category.

There are no expected costs associated with this proposed regulation amendment other than the costs associated with promulgating this regulation. The agency receives zero revenue and has no costs associated with continuing education.

This proposed regulation amendment was developed during publicly noticed open meetings of the Board, and the Board is following all notice and open meeting hearing requirements associated with promulgating regulations, which will entail at least 3 more open meetings related to this regulation.

Beginning in 2022, the national credentialing agency for athletic trainers, the Board of Certification (“BOC”), no longer requires athletic trainers to complete continuing education in the category of evidence-based practice (“EBP”). This has resulted in EBP courses no longer being offered in continuing education programs and makes it more difficult and costly for Kansas athletic trainers to attend and complete EBP courses. The Kansas Athletic Trainers’ Society (“KATS”) and members of the Board’s Athletic Trainers’ Council (“AT Council”) asked the Board to consider the new national standard and not require Kansas athletic trainers to complete EBP continuing education courses. These issues were discussed at open meetings of the AT Council in November 2021 and February 2022. The proposed regulation amendment was discussed and approved by the Board at its open meeting in February 2022.

A summary of the proposed amended regulation and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 100-73-7. License renewal; continuing education.

The purpose of this proposed regulation amendment is to implement a 24-month biennial reporting period for continuing education hours required to renew a radiologic technologist license. This proposed regulation amendment benefits licensed radiologic technologists and the businesses that employ them by implementing a reporting period that creates an additional mode of continuing education compliance.

There are no expected costs associated with this proposed regulation amendment other than the costs associated with promulgating this regulation.

This proposed regulation amendment was developed during publicly noticed open meetings of the Board, and the Board is following all notice and open meeting hearing requirements associated with promulgating regulations, which will entail at least 3 more open meetings related to this regulation.

The national credentialing agency for radiologic technologists (the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (“ARRT”)), uses a 24-month biennial reporting period for radiologic technologists (“LRT”) to maintain their national ARRT credential. The ARRT requires 24 hours of continuing education each 24-month period. Kansas currently requires 12 hours of continuing education each 12-month LRT licensing year (October 1 – September 30). The Kan-

sas Society of Radiologic Technologists and members of the Board's LRT Council supported retaining the Kansas 12 hours in 12-months continuing education standard and amending the regulation to add the national 24 hours in 24-months continuing education standard as a second option for Kansas licensed LRTs that also hold a national credential. These issues were discussed at the open meeting of the LRT Council in January 2022. The proposed regulation amendment was discussed and approved by the Board at its open meeting in February 2022.

Permanent Administrative Regulation

Article 17.—SPONSORING ORGANIZATIONS

109-17-3. Sponsoring organization; initial course of instruction. (a) Any sponsoring organization may conduct an approved initial course of instruction through in-person instruction or distance learning, or a combination of both.

(b) Each sponsoring organization shall provide an enrollment roster listing each student enrolled in the course to the executive director within 20 days of the date of the first scheduled class session.

(c) Each sponsoring organization providing an initial course of instruction shall permit each student and the board access at each scheduled class session for in-person inspection of the course syllabus and all policies or documents addressing the following:

- (1) Student evaluation of course;
- (2) student attendance;
- (3) student discipline;
- (4) student and participant safety;
- (5) student requirements for successful course completion;
- (6) Kansas requirements for certification;
- (7) student dress and hygiene;
- (8) student progress conferences;
- (9) equipment use;
- (10) infection control; and
- (11) acknowledgement of the commitment to provide the support as defined in the course curriculum from each of the following:
 - (A) Educational medical director;
 - (B) ambulance service director for each ambulance service utilized for field training; and
 - (C) administrator of each medical facility utilized for clinical training.
- (d) The course syllabus shall include at least the following information:
 - (1) A summary of course goals and objectives;
 - (2) student prerequisites, if any, for admission into the course;
 - (3) instructional and any other materials required to be purchased by the student;

(4) a description of the clinical and field training requirements, if applicable; and

(5) instructor information, which shall include the following:

- (A) Instructor name;
- (B) office hours or hours available for consultation; and
- (C) instructor electronic-mail address.

(e) Each sponsoring organization providing an initial course of instruction shall provide confirmation of each student's successful course completion to the board.

(f) Each sponsoring organization shall schedule a psychomotor skills examination for the student's initial examination as specified in K.A.R. 109-8-2.

(g) Each sponsoring organization shall maintain the following course records for each initial course of instruction for at least three years from the last date of class:

- (1) Course syllabus;
- (2) all policies or documents addressing the listed items in subsection (c);
- (3) student attendance;
- (4) student grades;
- (5) student conferences;
- (6) course curriculum;
- (7) lesson plans for all lessons;
- (8) clinical training objectives;
- (9) field training objectives;
- (10) completed clinical and field training preceptor evaluations for each student;
- (11) a copy of each student's psychomotor skills evaluations;
- (12) a completed copy of each student's evaluations of each course, all instructors for the course, and all lab instructors for the course; and
- (13) a completed copy of the outcome assessment and outcome analyses tools used for the course that address at least the following:
 - (A) Each student's ability to perform competently in a simulated or actual field situation, or both; and
 - (B) each student's ability to integrate cognitive and psychomotor skills to appropriately care for sick and injured patients.

(h) Each sponsoring organization providing initial courses of instruction shall maintain an average pass rate of at least 70 percent on the cognitive examination for certification at each level of certification that the sponsoring organization instructs for all first attempts made by the students in the preceding calendar year. Each sponsoring organization that fails to meet or exceed this average pass rate shall submit to the board a plan for ensuring that future first-time cognitive examination pass rates meet or exceed this average no later than March 1.

(i) Any sponsoring organization may allow a student to enroll late in an initial course of instruction upon submitting to the executive director a make-up schedule that includes the provision of educational standards that the late enrollee missed, within seven days of the student's enrollment.

(j) Each sponsoring organization providing a paramedic initial course of instruction shall provide one of the following:

- (1) Evidence that the sponsoring organization has been

issued and maintains a current letter-of-review from the committee on accreditation of educational programs for emergency medical services professions; or

(2) evidence that the sponsoring organization holds accreditation from the committee on accreditation of allied health education programs.

(k) Each sponsoring organization shall provide any course documentation requested by the executive director within 30 days of the request.

(l) Violation of any provision of this regulation may subject the sponsoring organization to a civil fine and may result in a suspension of sponsoring organization approval. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2021 Supp. 65-6110; implementing K.S.A. 2021 Supp. 65-6111; effective Dec. 31, 2021; amended Sept. 9, 2022.)
